DEMOCRATIC CHIEF IS BOLTING PARTY. Senator Wheeler Announces Preference for La Follette.

Washington, July 17.—Senator Wheeler, democrat, Montana, will not support John W. Davis, the democratic presidential nominee. Announcing this decision Mr. Wheeler, who directed the senate inquiry into former Attorney General Daugherty's administration, said he intended, however, to support the democratic state ticket in Missouri, and work for the reelection of Senator Walsh.

As for his own vote, Senator Wheeler said it "likely" will be cast for Senator La Follette. He declared, however, that he would not accept endorsement as a vice-presidential candidate on the La Follette ticket if it were offered him.
