BETHEL ARSON TRIAL TESTIMONY CONTINUES

Insurance Inspectors Today Are Blamed for Merchandise Piled in Center of Room.

Bridgeport, Conn., March 25 (AP)—Merchandise which was piled near the center of the room in the Bethel plant of the Xcluso company and in which the incendiary fire was started last April, was arranged at the request of fire insurance company inspectors. It was testified before Judge John W. Banks in superior court today by Peter Rosenweig, New York city, who was shipping clerk in the Frost factory.

Abraham "Whitey" Friedman and Sam Welsberg, alias Sam Cohen, have testified that Frost had expressly hired Cohen and expressly ordered him to stack goods in the room for the particular purpose of expediting the arson plot.

Rosenweig declared today that it was he who gave instructions to

Cohen to assist another man in piling the goods in the room after inspectors ordered that the pile be removed from the vicinity of walls and windows.

Other instructions given by the agents of the fire insurance company, Rosenweig said, was to repair a watchman's clock and the sprinkler system. He said Frost gave orders to have carried out immediately all of the suggestions made by the inspectors.

WILL REWARD IDEAL TEACHERS AND PUPILS

Philadelphia To Entertain Best From Every State During Sesqui-Centennial

Philadelphia, March 25 (AP)—Directors of the Sesqui-Centennial exposition today announced the establishment of awards as a tribute to the youth and teachers of America.

The winners, a boy and girl, and a woman school teacher from each state, will come to Philadelphia as guests of the exposition from June 28 to July 5 and will participate in Independence Day exercises at which President Coolidge will speak. They also will be taken on a two-day trip to Washington and to Valley Forge. All their expenses will be paid by exposition officials.

Committees with headquarters in the state capitals, will select the winners and it will be left largely to these committees to decide on what basis candidates shall be judged as exemplifying American ideals in their states. The directors announced, however, that they expected the awards to be made with emphasis on the qualities of courage,

heroism, sacrifice, leadership and patriotism.

Any American girl or boy between the ages of 13 and 19 and any woman teacher is eligible to become a candidate.
