FINANCIAL NOTES.

Of General Local Interest--The Bank Clearings--Stock Dividends. The New Haven clearing house reports the clearings and balances for the third week in June, 1893 and 1894. The decrease from last year is about 10 per cent:

The books of the Baltimore and Ohio railroad close to-day for the semi-annual dividend of 3 per cent, on the preferred stock payable July 2.

The transfer books of the Shore Line railroad closed Saturday for a dividend of 4 per cent, payable July 5.

On Saturday of this week the Boston and Albany railroad will pay a quarterly dividend of 2 per cent.

The United States Rubber company has declared a semi-annual dividend of 4 per cent, payable July 14 on the preferred stock. There will be no dividend on the common stock.

The American Express company has declared a semi-annual dividend of 3 per cent, payable July 2, and the Wells Fargo Express 4 per cent, payable July 14.

The National Bank of Commerce in New York has declared a semi-annual dividend of 4 per cent, payable July 2. The transfer books closed on Saturday last.

Next Saturday the Providence and Worcester railroad pay a quarterly dividend of 2 1-2 per cent.

New Haven Water company old stock is quoted 99 bid 101 asked; the new stock 66 bid 68 asked, on the latter a further installment of \$2 per share will be due in a year from now.

Hiram Kantrovich Gully. In the court of common pleas, criminal side, Saturday afternoon, the jury which has been trying the case of Hiram Kantrovich, accused of selling without a license, returned with a verdict of guilty. Kantrovich was fined \$3 and costs, the same as in the city court. His counsel, Attorney J. E. Goodhart, says he will appeal the case to the supreme court.
