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OVER TWO HUNDRED DEAD.

Great Loss of Life by a Mine Explosion—Women Around the Pit. London, June 24.—The further exploration of the Pont-y-Fridd mine, in which an explosion occurred yesterday, has shown that the disaster was far beyond anything imagined last night. The number of dead is 251. The original report that only 200 men were in the mine was due to a misunderstanding on the part of the manager, who thought a shift had just come up. Many of the dead bodies were mangled beyond recognition.

Crowds of women still surround the pit, awaiting news from husbands and brothers. Exploration of the mine is slow and difficult, owing to the blocking of the galleries with wreckage and dead horses.

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
