

HE WENT AT HIS ELECTION.

Versailles, June 27.—The electoral congress called to elect a president of the French republic to succeed the late President Carnot, began its session in the palace here at 1:10 o'clock this afternoon.

M. Challemlacour, president of the senate, presiding. The great hall of the palace was crowded, and the galleries were thronged with spectators.

After Challemlacour had read the form investing Casimir-Perier with the powers of the presidency he made an emotional speech, and then turning to the president embraced him heartily.
