A.&B. CO. STOCK BRINGS PROFIT OF 49,900 PER CENT.

Albert Pollack, formerly connected with the stock exchange house of P. J. Goodhart & Co., of New York, bought 2,500 shares of the American & British Manufacturing Co. of this city, at auction four years ago for \$250.

That same stock was a "war bride" yesterday, and 2,500 shares changed hands in the early trading at \$50. It was reported that Mr. Pollack, or his successor as bargain hunter, could not resist the temptation to take a profit of 49,900 per cent.

Records of the auction sales at Muelle's showed that three years ago a person with more courage than Mr. Pollack bought 500 shares of the stock for \$150, or 30 cents a share. He may be holding it for higher prices.

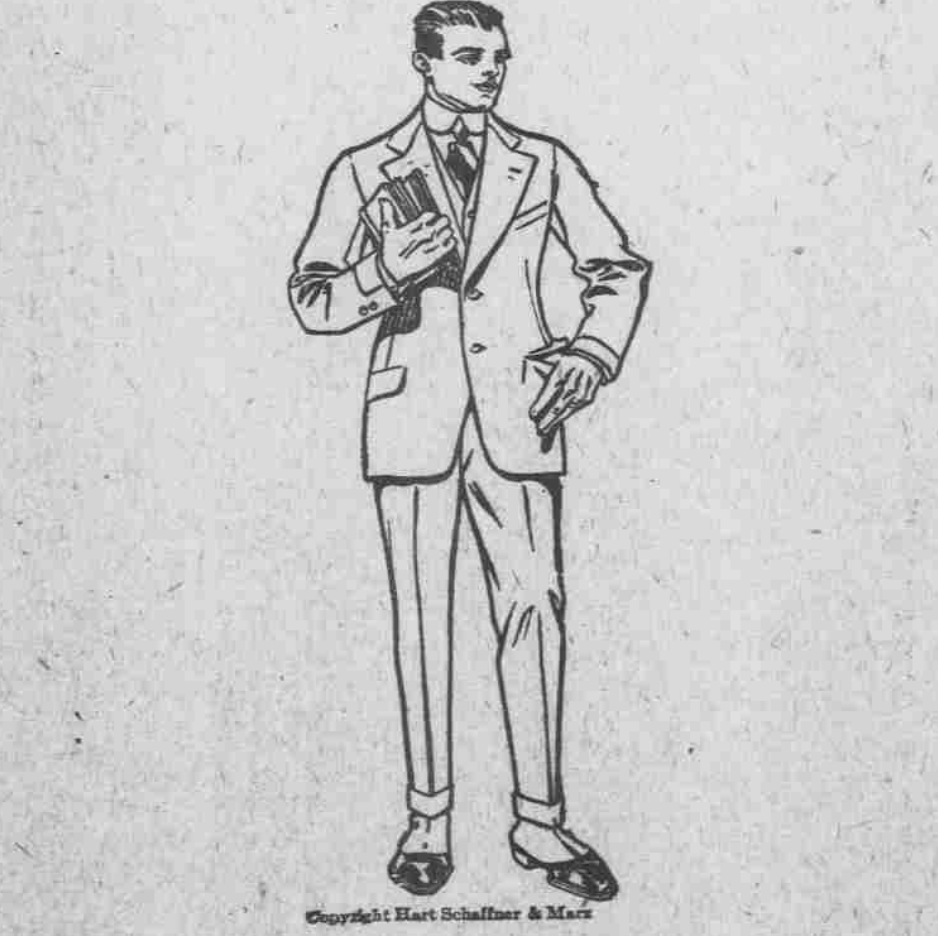
These transactions took place when the American & British concern, a subsidiary of the International Power Co., was an ordnance company struggling with only casual orders from the United States Government.
