PORTUGUESE TO NAME PRESIDENT

COLD WEATHER STEMS MOHAWK RIVER'S RISING

Schenectady, N. Y., Feb. 21.—The sudden drop to below zero in the early morning stemmed, at least, temporarily, what for a time promised to be the worst flood in the history of this city, due to the overflowing of the Mohawk river, shortly after midnight the river was 23 feet above normal.
