DR. VIRGINIA HUSSEY ATTEMPTS SUICIDE

Woman in Serious Condition—"Confessed" Last July to Slaying Her Husband Philadelphia, Nov. 17 (AP)—With two self-inflicted bullet wounds near the heart, Dr. Virginia Alvarez Hussey, who last July greeted a sensation by "confessing" that she had slain her husband, Lindly M. Hussey, novelist, and "the other woman," was in a critical condition today at the Miser Cordia hospital. After the police had found Hussey and "the other woman," Mrs. Grace Tallow Sauver, wealthy divorcee, alive at an artist's colony near Sergeantville, N. J., Dr. Hussey was committed to the Norris-town state hospital. She was released two months ago and friends said she and her husband became reconciled, although they were not living together. In legal proceedings closing the incident Mrs. Sauver denied having been unduly friendly with Hussey.

SALEM FIRE

Salem, Mass., Nov. 17 (AP)—Fire which swept the second story of a three-story structure occupied by the American Coal and Charcoal company here today, destroyed 4,000 bushels of charcoal and 60,000 small bags of wood. The loss was estimated between \$5,000 and \$10,000.

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Henry McNamara Returned to Pay \$1.50 for Rabbits

Henry McNamara, aged 34, of 25 Huriburt street was fined \$1 and costs by Judge W. D. Barry in police court today on the charge of assaulting Walter Klees, aged 14, of 284 North street. The boy testified that he sold a rabbit to McNamara for \$1 some time ago and received payment, but a later deal of the same nature left McNamara owing him \$1.50. On Thursday, he met McNamara on the street and asked him for the money, which McNamara denied owing. Even if he did owe it to him he would not pay it, he said, and Klees was not "big enough" to do anything about it. Klees admitted that he was no match for him physically and McNamara punched him on the side of the head and knocked him into the gutter. An old man helped him to his feet, he testified, and McNamara went on his way.

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
