AGAINST FOOTBALL GAMES.

Rector of St. Patrick's Cathedral in Newark Criticizes the Game.

Newark, N. J., Nov. 21.—Mgr. Doane, rector of St. Patrick's Cathedral in Newark, and one of the best known Catholic clergymen in this part of the country, came out yesterday afternoon in an open letter against football, in which he says:

I have never seen a prize fight, a bull fight or a turkey gizzard and the accounts I have read of them I should think they were about equally brutal. Why call the Rugby game a game? Why not call it a battle? Why call it playing when it is fighting? The place where it is played is an arena, equipped like a battlefield, with surgeons and stretchers, if not ambulances. It seems vain to raise a voice against it when you read that at Princeton last Saturday some \$70,000 was spent to see Yale and Princeton hammer each other.

It seems that this time no reports in injuries were inflicted, but the reporters say that many were battered and bruised, and the captain of the Princeton team had to go home for a week to recover from his strain. We have laws against bull fights and dog fights and prize fights. Why is there not a law against such contests as these, in which violence and restlessness carry the day? How can it be otherwise than demoralizing not only to those who take part in them, but to those who witness them? Some other name than "muscular Christianity" will have to be devised for these so-called "manly" games, if a spade is to be called a spade.

It is very strange that Frank Warner preferred to play with Meriden rather than with the Waterbury team. When he was with Meriden before he was injured, he was one of the best players in the league. He is now in the hands of the doctors, and it is doubtful if he will ever be able to play again.

ON THE GRIDIRON.

All Eyes Now Centered on the Yale-Harvard Game.

The betting on the Yale-Harvard game yesterday was at even money. Indications point to a large amount of money being wagered on this event. Critics still believe that the eleven are evenly matched, all things considered. While the Yale team is conceded to be the heavier in the country, the Harvard eleven is not far behind.

Yale has six fullbacks in Hamer, Brown, Sheldon, Stillman and Coy in the rush line, but Harvard can match them with Campbell, Lee, Balfour, Lawrence and Hallowell. In point of weight, Harvard has the heavier ends, but Yale has the larger tackles. As the guards the Blues have a straight advantage in avoirdupois, while it is about a stand-off at center. The back fields are equally balanced, the great line backer, Perry Hale, being matched by Shirley Ellis. The frame will, therefore, be contested by the heaviest and tallest players on the gridiron this season. The question of endurance, it seems, is getting a more important figure than any other factor, and in this respect Yale appears to have the call.

In all of the games this season the Yale men have shown an ability to finish strongly. In fact, they have played with more aggressiveness and power in the second half than in the first. This was the case against Columbia and against Princeton. Yale makes brilliant starts in both instances. The statement coming from New Haven that Wear may be displaced by Fincke as Yale's quarter back is a source of satisfaction to many supporters of the Blue who have seen Wear's muffs and fumbles in recent games. With Fincke in the line it is believed that Yale's most palpable weakness should disappear, while the presence of Sharpe at half back should strengthen the team in punting and drop kicking.

Some of the more skillful players in the Yale and Harvard line are Dan Hale and Harry Lane. In the line, Dan Hale and Harry Lane are in the line, and Ellis, the Harvard punter, are in their best form. Many experts have wondered why Fincke was not substituted for Wear some time ago, but the explanation of the coaches has always been that Wear possessed the head and showed superior judgment in handling the eleven. Fincke, however, made such a splendid showing at half back against the Indians and Princeton that the coaches, in view of the fact that Fincke is both a punter and a blocker, have probably concluded that a change is both timely and advisable. With Wear fumbling in the Harvard game, it is pointed out that the fleetness of the Crimson ends may result fatally for Yale. Fincke has had experience at quarter back and has shown that he will be a hand on the ball. With Wear's muffs and fumbles, Harvard men argue that if Captain Dale is himself Yale will be out-generaled. Dale was never seriously injured, though he took to his bed for several days and carried a cast on his knee and it is deemed wise for him to take things easily. Those who know him are now saying that Dale will be at his best on this occasion, which means everything to the eleven. As far as the matter of the eleven is concerned, Yale will put the same team in the field, barring Fincke at quarter back and Sharpe at half back, that defeated Princeton, while Harvard will depend upon the same combination that vanquished Pennsylvania, except possibly Burnett at center in the place of Sargent. In point of physical condition, the skill of two of the best football trainers in the country, Mrs. Murphy and Jack McManis, will be put to a thorough test. Murphy so far has exceeded all previous records, but McManis has prepared the Crimson team in recent years with much cleverness. The demand for seats is large but unavailing. A New York hotel yesterday a Harvard graduate offered \$125 for five seats, but there was not one to be had at that or any price. It is doubtful whether any will be placed on sale in New York. Julian Curtis, who is manager of the Yale team, says that 35,000 seats could be easily disposed of, if there was room for them in the big stands.


