EPISCOPAL HEADS MEET THIS MONTH

Bishop Budlong to Preside at Choate School Sessions September 23 to 25

Wallington, September 17. — The annual conference of the Episcopal clergy of the Diocese of Connecticut will be held at Choate School on September 23 to 25 under the presidency of the Bishop of Connecticut, Rt. Rev. Frederick G. Budlong.

The theme of the conference for the three-day session will be "The Educating Church," with nationally-known religious education leaders conducting discussions and seminars.

Among the speakers at the conference will be the following: Rev. Dr. Daniel A. McGregor, executive secretary of the Department of Religious Education of the National Council of the Episcopal Church and professor of apologetics at the General Theological Seminary, New York City; Rev. Dr. Luther A. Weigle, dean of Yale Divinity School and author of "The Pupil and the Teacher"; Rt. Rev. Henry K. Sherrill, Bishop of Massachusetts and chairman of the General Convention Army and Navy Commission; Rev. Dr. Horace Donegan, rector of St. James's Church, New York City, and conductor of a religious education program in seven New York parishes last year; and Samuel G. Wallis, Jr., religious editor of Time magazine.
