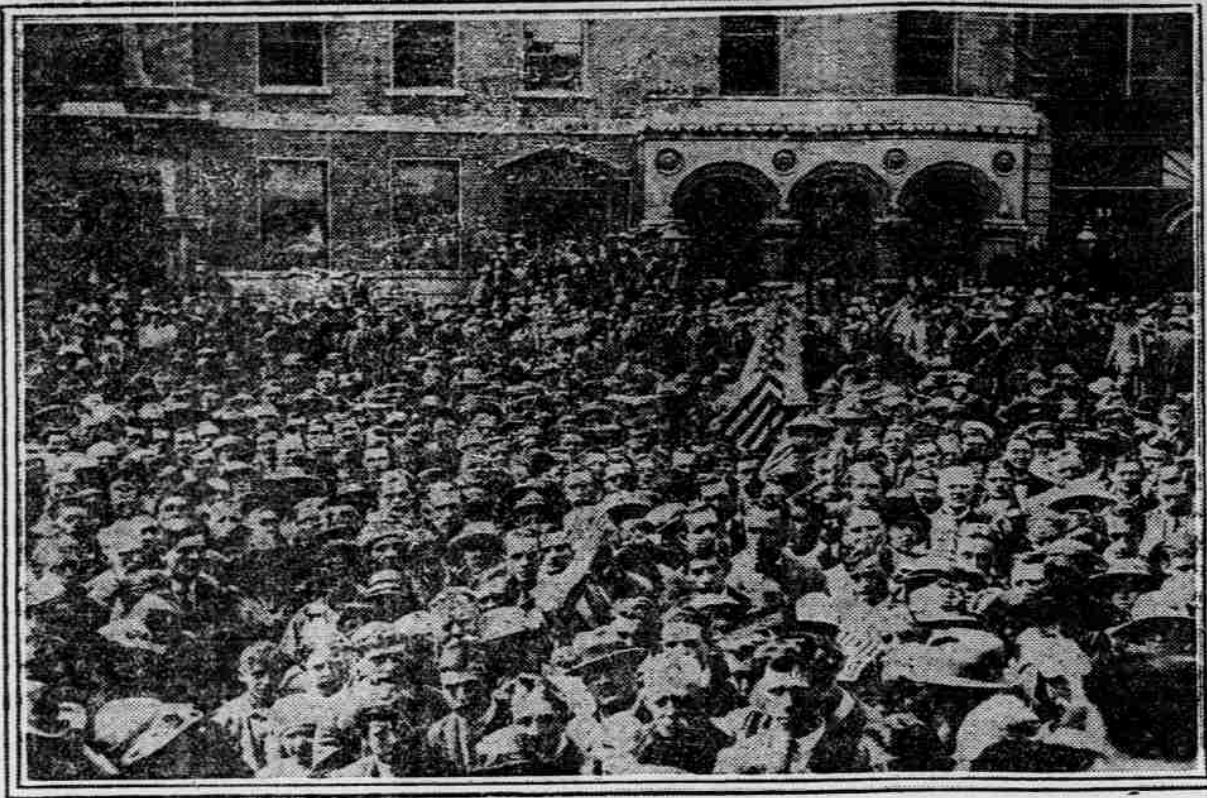
President Obregon met newspaper men last night, and seemed inclined not to treat the Herrera revolt seriously.

NEWS PRINT FROM WASTE.

Chicago, July 16.—There is approaching completion in this city a paper mill which, instead of making newspaper from wood pulp, will manufacture it from waste paper.

The mill is owned by the Waterway Paper Products Company, of which Arthur Strong, auditor of the Chicago Daily News, is president, and Emanuel Mendelsohn is vice president and treasurer.

The Chicago Daily News, it is learned, has entered into a contract with the Waterway Paper Products Company of 20 years' duration whereby it guarantees to take about 7,000 plus basis a minimum of 7,500 tons of newspaper annually.
