

CANNOT COMPETE WITH AMERICANS

Leverkursen, Germany July 22.—German dyestuff manufacturers' total production this year will not exceed 60,000 tons, which will make it impossible to "flood" the markets of England or America, or even compete successfully against American manufacturers, asserts Dr. Carl Duisberg, head of Germany's greatest dye manufacturing organization.

"We have recently increased our capital to 1,762,800,000 marks, which is 719,000,000 more than our previous capital, but this was the inevitable consequence of the tremendous depreciation of our currency and resultant increases in the prices of commodities," he said. "It has nothing to do with intended attacks on the world market, which it has been reported we were planning.

"Labor difficulties, shortage of coal, the unsatisfactory traffic conditions, as far as the Rhineland is concerned, the obstacles, caused by the Rhine customs barrier, all prevent us, in any case, from increasing our output, and leave us in a far from satisfactory position. This position is made worse by the hindrances placed in our way in many foreign countries."

Dr. Duisberg characterized a reported demand in some American quarters for the closing of German dyeworks because "they might be used for the manufacture of explosives and poison gas in another war" as "utterly senseless, since Germany has been deprived of the means of employing poison gases for war purposes, even if she wanted to." He added that "no sane man in Germany thinks of fresh wars."

"It is difficult to understand American anxiety," he continued, "for the American industry is incomparably stronger than ours."

MAY TAKE BANK TO PUBLIC SCHOOL

Minneapolis, Minn., July 22.—Plans of the American Bankers Association to dispel mystery about banking in the public thought by taking the bank to the public school this fall were outlined to the American Institute of Banking here today by John H. Puellcher of Milwaukee. Mr. Puellcher is chairman of the association's committee on public education.

By showing that they occupy a useful place in society the bankers hope to cut the foundation for under a radicalism that thrives on ignorance of the services of the banking business, he said.

"Ten lectures on banking have been carefully prepared, one for each month of the school year, starting with next September," Mr. Puellcher related. "The banker nearest the school is to deliver the lectures to the 7th and 8th grades of the common school, to the high school and the college. He will simply refer to the outlines for ideas and background, localizing the story, using illustrations and incidents familiar to the children.

"He will show them specifically what banking is, telling them about its origin and its purpose in our commercial scheme. Then, after two or three visits the banker will invite the school children to the bank and permit them to visualize that which has been talked about.

"The lecture outlines have been sent to the superintendents of public

instruction of all of our states and to many others in the teaching profession. Scores of letters have been received from educators approving the plan and promising active cooperation.

"Many financial magazines have agreed to publish each month a lecture to be delivered the following month. Text book publishers are planning to enlarge chapters on banks and banking in the treatises on economics. School boards have agreed to endorse the work."

EMPLOYEES IN CHARGE.
Mexico City, July 22.—The Mexico branch of the Wells Fargo Express Company, which was taken over by

the Mexican government simultaneously with railroads in 1914, henceforth will be administered by employees appointed by the company. The official announcement to this effect added, however, that the government would continue to exercise an operating control.

It is understood that Mexico is anxious to terminate its operation of express companies, but does not consider the step can be taken until the railroads are returned to their owners.

INJURED BY FALLING PLANK.
Earle J. Kellar, 22, of 247 Willow street, suffered a severe laceration of the scalp this morning when a plank from one of the painter scaffolds on Yellow Mill bridge fell and struck him on the head. Kellar was treated by Dr. Kornblut of the Emergency Hospital staff. He is one of the workers on the bridge and was mounting a ladder at the time he was struck.
