

They, as expert horse-men, also say that for a man to be swept or knocked from the back of a horse by

or knocked from the back of a horse by limbs of trees is not uncommon, particularly when the hourses are being ridden at high speed. They believe a limb caused the fall of Shay and Flint.

A board of officers, however, will be appointed, which will further investigate the mysterious affair, and until this board reports Shay will be kept in confinement.
