

LOCAL MATTERS.

SCHOOL CENSUS.—Mr. S. Hervey, who was appointed by the School Trustees of the Nevada District to take the census of the school children and minors, has completed his work, and furnishes us the following figures: Whole number of white children in the District under 21 years of age, 769, of which only 23 are over 18; number of school children between 4 and 18, 404—221 boys and 183 girls; under four years, 332. Of the whole number, 422 were born in California. No deaf and dumb or blind children are reported. According to the census of last year, the number of school children was 359; number under four, 314; showing an increase of 45 school children, and of 18 under four years. The Nevada District includes the city, and that portion of the township lying above. The whole number of children in the city limits is 557; number of families in the District, that have children, 308, of which 227 reside in the city.

HENNESSY TURNPIKE CO.—We learn that a number of moneyed men of Nevada have subscribed for all the stock in the Hennessy Turnpike Company not heretofore taken. The company will now have plenty of funds, not only to complete the road, but to keep it open and in excellent condition during the coming winter. C. Wilson Hill, one of the Directors, started for Eureka yesterday, to settle with the contractors, and pay the balance due them. The bulk of the stock is now in the hands of a few men, who believe it to be a good investment, and who will of course have control of the affairs of the company. It is their intention to keep the road open so that loaded teams can cross the mountains at all seasons of the year.

OAKLAND SCHOOL DISTRICT.—The School Trustees of the Oakland District—which includes that portion of Nevada township, south of Deer creek and west of Gold Flat, and outside of the city limits—have called an election, to decide whether the citizens will authorize a tax to pay the expense of maintaining a public school for an additional term of four months. It will be necessary to raise \$300; and the rate of taxation necessary to be levied, will be thirty cents on the one hundred dollars valuation of taxable property in the District. The election will be held at the school house, near the Town Talk House, on Saturday, Oct. 27th. This, we believe, is the first election ever called in the county, to decide on levying a school tax.

AMUSEMENTS.—We learn that Mr. Ashmore is having the building known as the Arcade, on Broad street, fitted up for the purpose of giving theatrical performances. The entire lower part of the building is to be made into one room, with raised seats, and a stage constructed in the rear. The building is of sufficient capacity to comfortably seat 250 persons, and is to be called "Ashmore's Melodeon." The intention is to give performances every evening. Ashmore has now gone below for a company.

POLICE ITEMS.—Tim Murray was arrested last Tuesday night, on a charge of drunkenness and disorderly conduct. A few hours rest in the calaboose had the effect to quiet his nerves, and being brought before Justice Smith in the morning, he plead guilty and was let off upon the payment of ten dollars. D. J. Havens was yesterday arrested for breaking the sidewalk on Main street, by driving over it with his team, in violation of a town ordinance, and fined six dollars.

PAY YOUR TAXES.—From and after Monday next, the 15th inst., the law requires the Sheriff to add five per cent. to the amount of all unpaid taxes. Tax payers desirous of saving costs, must pay up on or before that day. We learn that a considerable amount of money has been paid in this week on taxes, and the bulk of the unpaid taxes will doubtless be paid up to-morrow and next day.

CIRCUS.—The Metropolitan Circus Troupe, under the management of Messrs. Lathrop, Peoples and Franklin, is announced to give a performance in this place some time next week. The agent informed us that the company could not afford to advertise in country newspapers, and judging from their last performance in this place, we should hardly think they could.

HEALTHY.—There was considerable sickness in this neighborhood a few weeks ago, but Mr. Hervey, who has just completed the school census, informs us that it is now remarkably healthy. Among all the families in the District, he found but one sick child, and that one was nearly recovered.

DOG FIGHT.—The great matched dog fight, between "Tinker" and "Butt," comes off at Hughes' next Saturday afternoon. Sportsmen who lost money because they couldn't get any bets on the late horse race, will have a chance to make up their losses on the dog fight.

CITY IMPROVEMENTS.—It is a gratifying sign of prosperity to notice the many improvements going on in every part of town. Old buildings are being pulled down to give place to more durable structures, and others are in process of construction.

BACHELOR'S PARTY.—The first party given by the Bachelor's Club of Nevada comes off on Wednesday evening, Oct. 24th, instead of the 17th, as stated in our last.

BRECKINRIDGE MEETING.—Senator Gwin, and Messrs. Tilford, Barber and Dudley, are announced to speak in Nevada next Saturday evening.

ELECTION NOTICE.

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN THAT an Election will be held in Nevada county, on TUESDAY, NOVEMBER 6th, 1860, for the purpose of electing the following named officers:

Four Electors for President and Vice President; one Senator, for the 16th District, composed of Nevada county; five members of the Assembly; a County Supervisor, for the 2d District, composed of the townships of Grass Valley, Rough & Ready and Little York.

Township Officers—Two Justices of the Peace and two Constables for each Township.

Attention is directed to the provisions of an act entitled "an act to provide for paying certain equitable claims against the State of California, and to contract a funded debt for that purpose," approved April 30, A. D. 1860.

Also, to the provisions of an act entitled "an act recommending to the Electors of the State to vote for or against a Convention to revise and change the Constitution of the State," approved April 28, A. D. 1860.
