

## Olson Names Permanent Executive Committee of State Defense Group; Calls Parley During Legislature

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 12. (UP)—Gov. Culbert Olson today appointed a new and permanent executive committee of the state council of defense and called a meeting in Sacramento tomorrow to plan for a general conference of the entire council during the special session of the legislature next week.

Selected today were five of the six permanent committee chairmen and seven vice chairmen. They will serve with the governor as chairman, president of the state planning board (Dr. Samuel May of Berkeley) as vice chairman and the secretary of the league of California cities.

The permanent executive committee follows:

Committee on health, welfare and consumer interest—Archibald Young, Pasadena, president; California Council of Social Work, chairman; Richard Neustadt, San Francisco, regional director Social Security Administration, vice chairman.

Committee on civil protection—Attorney General Earl Warren, chairman; Adjutant General Richard Mittelstaedt, vice chairman.

Committee on housing, works and facilities—Baldwin Woods, Berkeley, regional director national resources planning board, chairman; E. S. Scattergood, manager Los Angeles Department of Power and Water, vice chairman; John Riffe, San Francisco, state director Steel Workers organization committee, second vice chairman.

Committee on human resources and skills—Gordon S. Watkins, dean University of California at Los Angeles, chairman; Harry See, San Francisco, state representative Railroad Brotherhoods, vice chairman; C. J. Haggerty, Los Angeles, president State Federation of Labor, second vice chairman.

## Governor Moves Special Legislative Session Up Amid Charges of Attempt To Discredit Administration Foes

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 12. (UP)—Governor Culbert Olson today called a special legislative session to meet tomorrow to consider additional appropriations for unemployment relief.

Anti-administration legislators attacked the call as "unnecessary and political."

Already Assembly Speaker Gordon Garland and Senate President Pro Tem Jerrold L. Seawell had issued a call to legislators to meet Sept. 21 to discuss relief measures. Seawell said the governor's call was "totally unnecessary" and that there probably would be no need for a second session next week.

"We can do all the business we planned under the governor's new call," Seawell said.

Olson said he was calling the legislature at this time because relief funds were depleted and not sufficient monies remained in the state emergency fund to finance the SRA until Sept. 21, the date fixed by Seawell and Garland for the legislature to meet.

The legislature's fact-finding committee on relief and SRA Administration S. G. Rubenow agreed last week \$1,450,000 would be needed to carry relief expenditures through this month. Another allocation will be available Oct. 1 on the start of a new fiscal quarter.

Olson declared he had been informed the legislative committee had asked approximately \$900,000 be loaned to the SRA from the emergency fund. But, the governor added, less than \$450,000 remains in this fund, and the balance could not safely be committed at this time.

He said he would ask Attorney General Earl Warren for a ruling on the validity of any legislative acts reformed in the special session called by Garland and Seawell, under a resolution passed by the legislature when it recessed last May.

Olson said this procedure was without precedent, considerable doubt existed as to its legality, and he declared the anti-administration leaders thus sought to keep control of legislative meetings by this maneuver. The legislature actually is in recess to Dec. 2, but the resolution decreed the lawmakers were subject to call at any time before that date.

## 'Wonder Why They Kept Me Here This Long' Says Golden-Voiced Senator In Bidding Farewell to Fellows

WASHINGTON, Sept. 12. (UP)—Henry Fountain Ashurst of Arizona, the senate's most candid and flowery orator, bade farewell to congress today with a bow, a smile, an oration on the joy of defeat, and a wondering question about how his constituents "kept him here this long."

Ashurst was defeated in Tuesday's Democratic primary after serving continuously in the senate since Arizona was admitted to statehood in 1912. He won't leave the senate until January, but defeat was an occasion requiring an immediate Ashurst oration.

The senators paid rapt attention, as they do only when they are moved. Ashurst was perhaps the senate's most popular member. One by one, senators filed by his desk to shake his hand.

Republicans and Democrats, senate clerks, crowded galleries and many members of the house listened as the Arizona bowed and said in his deep, rich voice:

"I carry with me precious memories. I will be thinking of you while you are worrying over patronage and bills, while I am enjoying the ecstasy of the stary stillness of an Arizona night. Perhaps I shall even be wandering through the petrified forest."

He said a taxicab driver asked him this morning what he planned to do for a living.

"I told him I could sell apples," the senator said.

"Sell apples?" the cab driver asked.

## Relief Commission Vacancies Filled By Olson Action

SACRAMENTO, Sept. 12. (UP)—Two of four vacancies on the State Relief commission were filled today by Gov. Culbert L. Olson with the appointment of Dean McHenry of the University of California at Los Angeles and Dr. Chester K. Gummess of Los Angeles.

McHenry replaced Mrs. Robert F. Fisher of Carliotta, Humboldt county, who resigned. Dr. Gummess, a physician and surgeon, succeeded Col. E. L. Peterson, Corona publisher. Peterson published anti-Olson editorials in his newspaper and was criticized by the governor for improper political activity for allegedly violating the "Little Hatch Act" provisions of the relief act.

Gov. Olson was still considering successors to Film Actor Melvyn Douglas and J. Stitt Wilson, Berkeley, both of whom resigned when named on the Democratic delegation to the Chicago national convention.
