DEATH OF ELIHU BURRITT. "THE LEARNED BLACKSMITH" DEAD AT THE AGE OF SIXTY-EIGHT.

HARTFORD, March 7.—Hon. Elihu Burritt, the distinguished philologist, reformer and philologist, died at his residence, New Britain, at midnight last night.

Elihu Burritt was born in New Britain, Conn., December 8, 1811. The son of a shoemaker, he was educated in the common schools of his native village, and at the age of 16 was apprenticed to a blacksmith. A desire to read the Scriptures in the original led him to philological studies.
