General News.

The democratic Legislature in New Orleans has rented Odd Fellows' Hall for its session.

It is stated that Hon. W. A. Wheeler will visit Gov. Hayes in a few days, "and remain with him some time."

Hon. Thomas W. Ferry was re-nominated for U. S. Senator by acclamation of the Republican caucus of the Michigan Legislature, last evening.

The Republican Legislature of Louisiana yesterday passed a bill reorganizing the State militia, and appropriating \$500,000 for the purpose.

It is now ascertained that there were 147 persons, passengers and employees on the train wrecked at Ashabula, Ohio. Of these 72 were rescued, 5 are missing, and 70 are presumed to be dead.

There is no disposition in the War Department to send any additional troops to the South, as there is no reason to believe that their presence is needed to preserve the public peace.

Gen. Van Allen, who attended the caucus in Louisiana at the request of President Grant, addressing a meeting of the Republican Reform Club in New York, last night. He expressed the belief that the action of the Returning Board was just and legal, and that "it is right and lawful to count the Electoral vote of Louisiana for Hayes and Wheeler."

Gov. Kellogg, Lieutenant Governor Antoine and U. S. Marshal Pitkin, have been summoned before the Morrison Committee at New Orleans. The committee, by a party vote, has decided to report against the election of the Western Union Telegraph Company, to the U. S. House of Representatives, as in contempt, in refusing to answer a second subpoena.

KEPT ALIVE ON ALLIGATOR MEAT.

THE STORY TOLD BY CAPTAIN TYLER, OF THE SCHOONER ANNE CARL.

Captain Tyler, of the schooner Ann E. Carl, which was wrecked off Sayo Key, south coast of Cuba, has arrived at his home, Northport, L. I., and tells an interesting story of his misfortunes and adventures. The schooner was making a very quick passage when a hurricane struck her. She was driven at its mercy for four days, and on the fifth, after beating over two coral-reefs, she was forced back aground on the key—a small, desolate island, the only inhabitants being a number of alligators, which swarmed around during the first night and came near devouring the crew. In fact, they were only kept off by a fire which the sailors succeeded in kindling.

The key is about sixty miles from the mainland, and out of the usual track of vessels, but soon after the Carl had thus been wrecked her crew were the means of saving a Spanish and an English crew, which had gone to pieces, and Captain Tyler, finding that he had to divide his scanty store of provisions—there being now thirty-five persons on the island—and that starvation would soon be staring them in the face, sent his mate and one seaman in a boat to Cienfuegos, about one hundred miles distant, with instructions to ask assistance from the United States Consul at Havana. On hearing the facts, the Spanish Government sent a gunboat with provisions for the relief of the shipwrecked crew, who were found in an almost famishing condition. Captain Tyler having left the island with his file three alligators, which were cooked and eaten. The mate chartered in Havana the bark Perce Hinkley, in which to ship what was saved of the wreck to New York.

On leaving the island, the ship was being very rough voyage, occupying thirty-eight days, when they were at Hatteras Inlet, with all sails blown away and all on board nearly starved, having for eight days been on short allowance of biscuit and water.

The schooner has been unfortunately having been wrecked twice before once at Norfolk, Va., and once off Block Island. By the first wreck Ross Jesse Carl, of Northport, who owned about one-half of the vessel, lost about \$7,000.

A REMINISCENCE OF STONEWALL JACKSON

In a recently published letter the Hon. Charles James Faulkner furnishes the following incident in the life of Gen. Stonewall Jackson: "At the age of 16 years Thomas Jackson was a constable of the county of Lewis, Va., with his uncle Cummings Jackson as his security. The first execution that came into his hands was against a widow living some twelve miles from the court-house.

There accompanied a man named Charles Post to accompany him and assist him in driving away the cattle which he proposed to levy upon. When he arrived there he found that the old woman had but one cow, the principle means of her support. So soon as he learned this he turned to his companion and said: 'Charlie, I will not levy this execution on the poor woman's cow; as poor as I am I would rather work night and day and pay 'the debt myself.' Upon that he left there and stated the facts to his uncle, his security, in his official bond. He listened to his narrative and then said: 'Tom I see you were never born to be a constable, my boy; resign your office at once and I will pay the execution.' Mr. Faulkner says also: 'I remember upon one occasion I received a telegram of the extreme illness of a daughter in Appomattox county, and communicating a message from her that she wished to make some request of me in person before she died. I took the telegram to Gen. Jackson and asked him for a leave of absence for a few days. He read it, and I observed a tear trickling down his cheek, and after pausing for a few moments he said: 'Colonel, I cannot refuse your request, for there is nothing in my opinion requiring my presence absolutely at headquarters; but I will announce to you the rules that govern my conduct. When I entered the army I gave myself up to my country, and from that time I have been especially attached to those I love, and especially to my daughter. The circumstances mentioned in this telegram, yet I would not feel myself at liberty to leave my post here. I have felt all that are dear to me in the hands of my country and of my God.'
