THE CONFEDERATE FORCE
AT GETTYSBURG.
It appears from the official returns
on file in the War Department, that on
the 31st of May 1863, the Army of
Northern Virginia numbered, infantry
fifty four thousand three hundred and
thirty six, and artillery, four thousand
four hundred and sixty, of all arms
eighty thousand three hundred and
fifty two effective. This was im-
mediately before the invasion of Penn-
sylvania, and may be regarded as rep-
resenting the maximum of General Lee's
army in the Gettysburg campaign. On
the 20th of July, 1863, after the return
of General Lee to Virginia, his army
numbered forty-one thousand three
hundred and eighty-eight effective,
exclusive of the cavalry corps, of
which no report is made in the return
of the date last mentioned, allowing
seven thousand three hundred and
twelve, a fair estimate for the cavalry
of the effective total of the army on
the 20th of July was forty nine thousand.
It appears, therefore, that General
Lee's loss in the Pennsylvania cam-
paign, was about nineteen thousand.
STEAM MOTORS.—A letter has been
written by a correspondent of a Phila-
delphia locomotive firm in Paris which
shows the interest which is manifested
in the subject of steam traction for street
railways abroad as well as in this coun-
try. He says that the use of steam upon
street railroads is making a great advance
both in England and France. In Paris
thirty-five machines are now in daily use
and they are now about to open another
line of six miles, coming into the heart
of the city, also to be worked by steam.
In several provincial towns also street
railways are being constructed to be
worked by steam power.
It is an extraordinary struggle that
has been carried on now for ten days
between the Russians and the Turks, in
the Bunka Pass of the Balkan moun-
tains. Both sides have received heavy
reinforcements during the progress of
the long struggle, and both have fought
with the greatest pertinacity and suc-
cess. The position is of extreme impor-
tance to both armies. If the Russians
lose it, their armies in Bulgaria will be
driven back to the Danube, if not across
the Danube. If the Turks fail to take
it, they must carry on their campaign in
Bulgaria, whether it be defensive or of-
fensive, under disadvantages that will
be hard to overcome.

THE MARCH OF NEW IDEAS.
The railway companies must take
heed, or they will find themselves set
back where they have so long been
masters. Georgia is a state not much
addicted to experiments; but a conven-
tion of her citizens setting up a "con-
servative" by a large majority has
adopted the extreme views on the
regulation of railways. The Constitu-
tional Convention of that State has
provided for the adjustment by the
Legislature of freight and passage rate
on all railways of Georgia. In that
State, as elsewhere these corporations
have so annoyed and injured the peo-
ple by capricious and unjust changes
in their tariffs that in self defense the
people are obliged to take the most
poles in hand. If the new constitu-
tion of Georgia is ratified by the popu-
lar vote in December next States of
the South and West will probably fol-
low this example with constitutional
amendments for the same purpose.
The railway companies can save them-
selves from this interference only by
voluntary concessions to the public
demands.—N. Y. Sun.
The Iowa democratic convention
passed resolutions yesterday demand-
ing the immediate repeal of the res-
umption act, restoration of silver to
its monetary power, the retention of a
greenback currency, approval of the
President's action in regard to the
South, maintenance of the right of a State
to regulate railroad corporations, but
with due regard to justice and reason-
able interest of both people and cor-
porations and holds the rights of capital
and labor equally sacred. Mr. Irish
was nominated for Governor.
Savings banks in New York are man-
aging a great expense for bookkeepers,
accountants and the higher officials, and
complaint is made of their extravagance.
One bank, with deposits amounting to
\$9,000,000, expends \$34,500 per year for
salaries and other expenses; another
with \$10,000,000 deposits, spends \$22-
466 per annum for similar expenses. The
Bowers Savings Fund has expenses
amounting to \$38,200 per annum, but its
deposits reach the large aggregate of \$29-
000,000.
