

A ROW AT THE ALTAR.
A BROKEN OFFICE TO HIS SISTER'S MARRIAGE AND SHOTS AROUND.
A startling episode, which came near ending in a tragedy, occurred in Milwaukee on Thursday, in connection with the marriage of Mr. L. B. Gregg, a wealthy business man, and Miss Augusta Sherman, daughter of Mr. James P. Sherman, a wealthy private banker. Mr. J. P. Sherman, a brother of the lady, remonstrated against the marriage, and his parents refusing to listen to him, he became violent and made threats. When the wedding party arrived at the residence of the elder Sherman, the young man rushed to the room of Mr. Sherman the sister, and his son-in-law, Levi Blossom, followed the young man quickly, and found him armed with a loaded shot gun, which he leveled at his father. As he pulled the trigger Mr. Blossom threw up the barrel of the gun, and the murderous charge shattered a mirror in the room. Young Sherman then procured a revolver, but before he could make use of it he was bound hand and foot, and conveyed to the county jail, where he still remains. The marriage ceremony was then performed without further molestation.

Severe Upon Judge Sherman.
CLEVELAND, March 31.—The Cleveland Bar Association, this afternoon, considered the following resolution:
Resolved, That the testimony given by Judge C. T. Sherman, before the committee in the recent investigation in Congress, and letters admitted by him to be genuine, evince such want of integrity and such moral turpitude as to destroy all confidence in his judicial administration, and require that he should at once resign and relieve the federal Court from embarrassment consequent upon his continued occupancy of the judgeship.
Action upon the resolution was postponed, in order to give Judge Sherman an opportunity to communicate with the association.

ARREST OF A MURDERER.
HE CONFESSES HIS CRIME.
WASHINGTON, April 1.—A negro has been arrested here who admits that he killed the white driver back of the railroad depot, at the foot of Pennsylvania avenue, early on Saturday morning. He said he had been witness the hanging of a negro at Alexandria, on Friday morning, and had gone to Washington at night, where he fell in with the driver, who had been drinking and had considerable money on him. The negro says he got a "billy" from a friend and beat the driver to death with it. He then secured the murdered man's watch and money, and made for the woods. When arrested, the negro's clothes were full of blood stains. He is now in jail.
