Council Votes Police Higher Salaries and May Employ Specials

LARGER LOCKUP NEEDED FOR LAW OFFENDERS

Special to THE EVENING JOURNAL, NEW CASTLE, Del., May 7.

With a population of 4500 and no jail but a lock-up, and in that but one cell, this place is threatened with a famine of cells or other places for the safe keeping of offenders and at the meeting of Council last night it was said that the police had arrested a woman for infraction of the laws, but the one cell in the town at the time was occupied by a man. That disorder at times is serious and more cells are needed was attested to by Council. It was said that on Saturday nights the two policemen on duty could not leave Delaware street and as a result residents of Shawtown and Dobbinsville were talking of petitioning Mayor Rodney for additional police on those evenings. At times it is said women and girls cannot walk along some streets without being jostled by drunks.

This subject of better police came before Council when Mr. Sullivan said another cell, if not more, should be provided. He cited the instance where women would have been arrested if they could have been kept somewhere. It was said the cell they had in the town should be heated, otherwise a prisoner who might contract a serious cold while in it, could sue the city. This last trouble, it was explained, was due to the stove formerly in the cell being demolished. Mr. Sullivan also made a motion that two additional officers be employed for Friday and Saturday nights for work in Shawtown and Dobbinsville. Several members thought such action was vested in the Mayor after much discussion. Councilman Sullivan withdrew his motion saying he would appeal to the Mayor as an individual citizen for additional police protection.

Clerk White then read a letter from Mayor Rodney urging that the salaries now paid the two officers being increased from \$60 to \$65 a month. In his communication the Mayor claimed the men worked 88 hours a week and purchased their own uniforms. Councilman Speicher opposed the increase, claiming he thought they spent too much time on Delaware street, and while they worked long hours, they received a week's vacation. Councilman Poole claimed the officers were as good as officers in other cities who received more money and had a vacation period.

When the motion to increase the men's salaries was put, Councilman Speicher declared he wanted an eye and may vote as he desired to be recorded as voting against it. This was done, Messrs. Poole, Boyce, McGrory, Weldin, Cavender, Sullivan and Wegmann voting for the increase and Councilmen Sentman and Speicher voting no.

Councilman Speicher said he favored paying three policemen if Council could pay them \$45 a month which was the salary at one time. At this point Councilman Poole said that residents of the Buttonwoods, his ward, never saw a policeman there, and some one said there were 20 saloons there. Mr. Poole replied: "No, but you get them drunk here and send them out there where they fight."

Council also voted to increase the wages of M. J. Reedy, the ash collector, from \$45 to \$50 a month, Mr. Reedy having made the request.

A communication was received from the traction company requesting permission to turn over to the Wilmington and Philadelphia Traction Company their contract with the Delaware Water Improvement Company, as the Wilmington concern is about to furnish our rent. The members thought it best to secure an opinion from the city solicitor on the matter, and this will be requested by Clerk White before the contract is transferred.

President Cavender, chairman of the committee on streets and roads reported concerning some scapings that had been done, and it was announced that the traction company had asked for bids for repairing Seventh street.

The first and second reading of the ordinance relating to the issuing of the \$30,000 worth of bonds for street improvements authorized by the last legislature, was also given. It will be given its final reading at a meeting to be held in the near future.

City Treasurer John B. Manlove, at the meeting of Council presented his report for the year ending March 28, 1913. Receipts for the year were \$18,550.76, and the expenditures, \$18,282.78.

The uncollected taxes are: For years 1904-05-06, \$66.70; For year 1909, 760.55; For year 1910, 258.59; For year 1911, 333.41; For year 1912, 3,477.04.

Total, \$4,896.29
