How the Nation Trusted McKinley in the Spanish War

"I presume that history will record as the great achievements of the administrations of President William McKinley, first, the establishment of the single gold standard; and, second, the consequences of the war with Spain, which were the acquisitions of the Philippine Islands, with their stupendous potential relation to the future trade of the United States with the Far East, and the independence of Cuba. But if I were to write the history of McKinley's administration I should with emphasis call attention to one incident that is without precedent in the history of parliamentary governments."

This remark was made to me by Chauncey M. Depew some years ago, while he was still serving as United States Senator from New York. I asked him what the incident was to which he referred and he replied: "I refer to the appropriation by Congress of fifty million dollars just after the war with Spain began, an appropriation which committed the disposal of the entire amount to the discretion of the President."

"I took some pains at the time to look up the history of appropriations by Congress and by parliamentary bodies and I was unable to find a single instance where an appropriation of any considerable amount had been made with specifying the purpose for which the money was granted. The people of this country and Great Britain have always been jealous of their exclusive right to state for what purposes the appropriations are made, forbidding always the diversion of the appropriations to any other purpose than that set forth in the grant."

"But here was an appropriation of fifty million dollars, one of the largest ever made by Congress, with no other designation of its purpose than that the expenditure of the funds should be absolutely and exclusively at the discretion of the President."

"To my thinking, this incident furnishes one of the strongest proofs of the fundamental belief of the American people in the permanence and soundness of their institutions. Congress had perfect confidence in McKinley, for he had taken as many members of Congress as he could conveniently summon to a conference into his confidence. I don't think the history of the White House can recall any more momentous gathering than were the two or three which took place in that building at the request of McKinley at the time of the Spanish War."

"What took place at those conferences has never been fully revealed and never will be. Nor was it known until after the war with Spain was ended why McKinley deemed the situation so grave that he felt justified in appealing to the entire Congress and to American citizens. "There sat with him men of pre-eminent position as Democrats and of pre-eminent position as Republicans. He spoke to them, however, as citizens and as legislators. I have been told that his manner and his words were extraordinarily impressive. All that we now know is that McKinley had discovered that we were utterly unprepared to go to war with Spain, and that some of our fortifications were useless for lack of ammunition. Money in large amounts was needed immediately to make good these deficiencies. McKinley in most graphic narration described the condition in several of the great ports. He also said that it was imperative as a precautionary measure that Spain should not know of this emergency. Therefore it was imperative that the money granted by Congress to meet the emergency should be granted directly to the President. The grant was made without dissent."
