

ASK \$75,000 FOR NEAR EAST

Campaign Opens Today With Luncheon at Hotel duPont

ARMENIAN TELLS OF NATION'S NEEDS

After many weeks of preparation and organization, Delaware's campaign to raise \$75,000 in the national effort to relieve the suffering and distressed in Armenia started today. The first function was a luncheon at the Hotel duPont at which team captains and supporters of the campaign were present. After the luncheon Marlon W. Slocum, organizer for the campaign, met fifty-one women who are captains of teams and explained to them in the minutest detail, how the work of soliciting for the campaign is to proceed. Mayor Taylor who is the State chairman, presided at the luncheon.

Dr. Raphael Constantinian of Armenia was the chief speaker. Dr. Constantinian came with the evidence of the need for relief from America to the Near East.

NEW MEXICO RATIFIES SUFFRAGE; 32D STATE

SANTA FE, N. M., Feb. 20.—The House of Representatives of the New Mexico Legislature Thursday ratified the Federal Woman Suffrage Amendment by a vote of 35 to 10.

The Senate passed the resolution on Wednesday by a vote of 17 to 5. Governor O. A. Larrazolo is expected to sign the resolution Saturday. New Mexico is the thirty-second State to ratify.

Thirty-six states are needed for ratification.

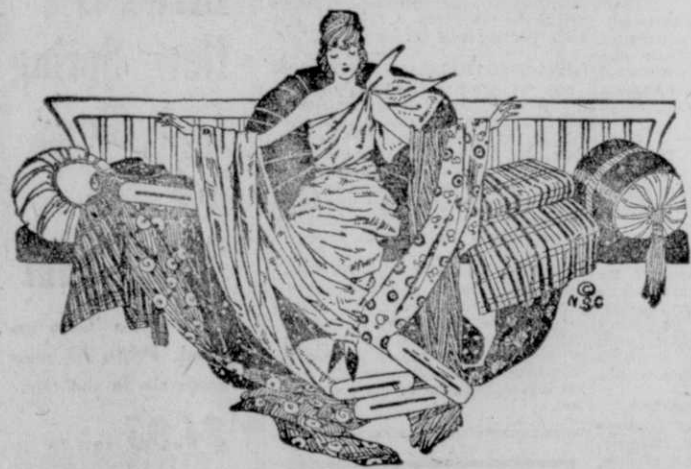
