Out-of-Town Business Men Talk of Bringing New Industries

COUNCIL TO BAN GAMBLING

NEW CASTLE, Feb. 20.—The Currents Event Class met in the Century Club rooms this afternoon. Current Events were read by Mrs. John B. The police say numerous complaints have been made to them concerning the lighting conditions of this city, especially in the case of Dorr's Alley, between Delaware and Fremont streets and Sixth and Cherry streets. These lights have been ordered by city council for several months. Several

persons who have made these complaints are demanding the reason for ignoring the orders of City Council. They say these places, owing to the lack of lights, are dangerous.

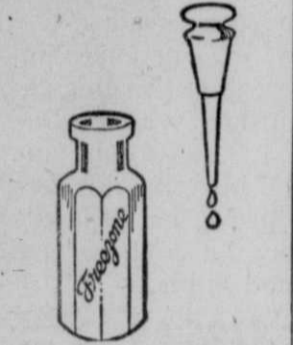
