SPRING STYLES Thierry Saw Them Last December—in Africa!

Men wear the queerest combination of any old thing at all. Half the men you see have coat, trousers and vests of different colors. Smart costumes for women are everywhere. The spring fashion—summer comes in December down here, remember—showed the silhouette the rage. This was especially true of coats and skirts, but less pronounced in dresses. Afternoon gowns and evening frocks show a great liking for tunics and flounces, tucks and tiny frills, all of which tend to disturb the simplicity of the silhouette's straight lines. Gowns of tailored gowns are cut very straight, and when in saque shape the slight fullness there is held in lightly by a belt. Other designs are cut quite straight, without any belt, and the slightly semi-fitting coat of the masculine persuasion is very popular. Most of the new skirts are absolutely straight and quite narrow, the average width being about a yard and a half at the hem. The fullness of the waist is manipulated in various ways. The easiest way in gathers, but box pleats and soft pleats are almost as popular. This fullness at the waist helps to give the effect of a skirt which runs in at the ankles, and in many of the new tailor-made costumes this effect is deliberately sought. Skirts of evening frocks are inclined to be rather more fussy. They're mostly made in soft tissues. Many evening frocks, are having skirts of Turkish inspiration, gathered at the hem and turned up. They are usually in georgette. Frocks of satin show draped skirts with drapery so arranged that it falls over the hips and clings around the ankles. Tunics are often cut full and sometimes pointed, so that they swing most gracefully above the narrow underskirt.

HEAD DECORATIONS. Wooden beads are extensively used as decorations for hand-bags, hats and even blouses and dresses. Most of these beads are brilliantly colored, while others are in natural wood. The sizes are as varied as the colors.

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SENATOR DEFENDS CHAIRMAN LAYTON

Staff Correspondent. STATE HOUSE, Dover, March 31.—Senator J. Carey Palmer came to the defense of Daniel J. Layton, Jr., of Georgetown, chairman of the Republican State Committee, in the Senate yesterday afternoon and at the same time launched an attack on The Evening Journal. Senator Palmer arose to a question of personal privilege during the afternoon session to deny that Chairman Layton had influenced the Sussex County Republican members as to their stand against ratification of the suffrage amendment. "There is a publication known as The Evening Journal doing business in this State that has maliciously and grossly done an injustice to the Chairman of the Republican State Committee," said Senator Palmer. "It has indirectly, if not directly cast reflections upon the members of the Legislature from Sussex county. "I have been associated in politics with Daniel J. Layton a number of years, and I know if Mr. Layton desired to select anyone to try to influence in this respect I naturally would have been the one. He has never by word or writing intimated as to what attitude he would like me to take on this important question. We

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as members of the Legislature resent this attack upon ourselves and Mr. Layton jointly." TURKISH EMBROIDERY.
