## STORM.

We was visited on the evening of Tuesday  
last with one of most violent storms of wind and  
rain, which was probably ever visited this or  
any other Country. For nearly forty hours  
the wind blew in all the fierceness of the most  
violent storms from North to North East, ac-  
companied with the greatest rain of water,  
sweeping every thing like bridges or Mill-dams  
in its course. We have already heard of the  
following number of Mill-dams in this County,  
which have been broken and many very much  
injured.

The mill at the head of Cedar Creek, Dr.  
Joseph Maull's mill at Milton, and three other  
mills above it on the same stream—Doe Bridge  
mill and four others on the same stream, Con-  
cord mill and three others on the same stream,  
and Russell's mill—and we have no doubt  
many others, if not nearly all the mills in the  
County have been injured in their dams or  
otherwise more or less. We have heard of  
three mills which have been washed intirely  
from their stations and carried down the cur-  
rent.

Above we have fifteen of the most valuable  
mills in our County, which will for some con-  
siderable time be out of use, making it still  
more difficult to obtain grinding. For many  
weeks our citizens have been going some twenty  
miles or more, to procure grinding, and so far  
as we have heard, there are but one mill a  
standing which can grind Wheat or Corn.
