

ROTARIANS HEAR OF WELFARE WORK

Representatives of Relief Organizations Describe Activities at Luncheon.

Social service activities in Washington were described to the Rotary Club yesterday at its luncheon in the Willard Hotel by leaders in welfare work here.

The symposium was opened by Ernest H. Daniel, chairman of the District Committee on Employment. Other speakers were Charles Demont, who discussed the problems of war veterans in the District; Charles A. Aspinwall, who told of child welfare work, and Arthur J. May, who made a plea for the maintenance of character-building institutions in Washington.

Housing conditions in a period of depression were discussed by John L. Weaver. Mr. Weaver said foreclosures are being held in abeyance and that the percentage of distress cases of mortgages is smaller than generally supposed. Work at the National Training School for Boys was described by Daniel J. Callahan. Dr. Allen Talbot called attention to the increasing duties of public hospitals laboring under reduced revenues.

Edwin C. Graham and Dr. Arthur C. Christie, the closing speakers, dealt with the activities of the Community Chest and the Council of Social Agencies. They told of the function of the Chest in raising funds and of the Council in advancing service standards of the various associated agencies.

The program was put on by the club's Community Service Committee, headed by William L. Radcliffe.

NAMED SPONSOR

Miss Katherine Duer Kempff to Help Launch New Submarine.

Miss Katherine Duer Kempff, who resided in Washington when her father, Rear Admiral C. S. Kempff, U. S. N., was on duty in the hydrographic office here, will be sponsor for the newly constructed submarine Cachalot, to be launched next month at the Portsmouth, N. H., navy yard. Admiral Kempff is now commandant at Portsmouth.

The Navy Department said the exact date of the launching of the Cachalot has not yet been set. The submarine was authorized by Congress in 1916, but funds for her construction were not made available until recently.

Empire State Leap Ends on a Ledge One Flight Down

NEW YORK, September 21.—A man identified by authorities as C. Cass Lawler, 32, leaped over the balustrade of the Empire State observation tower Tuesday and landed on a ledge at the eighty-fifth floor, one flight down. Had he missed the ledge he would have plunged 800 feet to the twenty-first-floor setback.

Taken to a hospital, he was found suffering from a possible skull fracture. In a pocket was a note, saying, "Have been sickly, with bad rheumatism. Home address, Mrs. T. J. Lawler, 561 Laurel ave., St. Paul, Minn."

FARMERS ACT TO GET CONTROL OF MILK

Group in Philadelphia Decide Not to Strike Pending Word From Washington.

PHILADELPHIA, September 21.—The first organized drive by farmers to take control of the Philadelphia milk supply out of the hands of the Interstate Milk Producers' Association was started yesterday with the launching of a new organization to represent them in the sale of milk to dealers.

Meanwhile, it was decided that no milk strike will be called by producers for the Philadelphia milk shed until after word has been received from Washington concerning adjustments of

the new Federal milk marketing agreement.

At the same time, milk-wagon drivers announced they would call a meeting tomorrow to discuss the question of a strike.

Wilbur K. Moffett, chairman of the Milk Code Protest Committee, announced he had instructed Charles Edwin Fox, counsel for the committee, to apply for a charter for the new dairy farmers' organization, which has not yet been given a name. Fox indicated this would be done at once.
