

Redskins Primed to Combat Dodgers' Parker-Schwartz Pass Combine Today

Filchok, Todd Loom As District Pros' Best on Attack

Flaherty Expects Win, But by Smaller Score Than in Game Here

NEW YORK, Nov. 11.—With special attention planned for Brooklyn's league-leading passer and pass-receiver, the Redskins slept here tonight before crossing the river tomorrow for their second game of the season with the still-threatening Dodgers.

They would have added the league's leading field-goal kicker and one of its best punters to the list of Indian menaces on the morrow, but the Redskins learned upon their arrival, not to their dismay, that they may not have to face an expected third danger point at Ebbets Field.

For Ralph Kercheval, who has booted six field goals in eight games—one from the 47-yard line—repeatedly still is bearing the effects of having his noggin soundly thumped on one of the gridiron's bar spots last Monday night, a knock resulting in a slight concussion. They say Kercheval still is a bit wobbly from a rap which would have sent a less-sturdy man to the sick bay for a week.

Dodger Passes Keen.
But Kercheval's prospective absence, partial or complete, won't lessen the threat of the Ace Parker-Perry Schwartz combination, a passing act which is proving nearly as effective as the Packers' famed Herber-to-Hulson duet. To date Parker has completed 52 passes or 48 per cent of those he has thrown, and most of them have been caught by Schwartz. The former Southern California flanker currently is credited with snagging 23 aeriels—three of them for touchdowns.

In addition he originated two of the touchdowns. In a game completed, one of them good for 31 yards, and handled the punting chore during the 35 or 40 minutes he was in the line-up.
Jim Blumenstock, who shared the left half assignment with Eshmont, took over at the start of the second period and steered the Rams to their first touchdown.

They made their bid after Hal Hursh sent a weak 10-yard punt out of bounds on Fordham's 41. Blumenstock picked 8 yards on one trip and 33 on another and Pet Holovak eventually circled his own left end 6 yards to score.

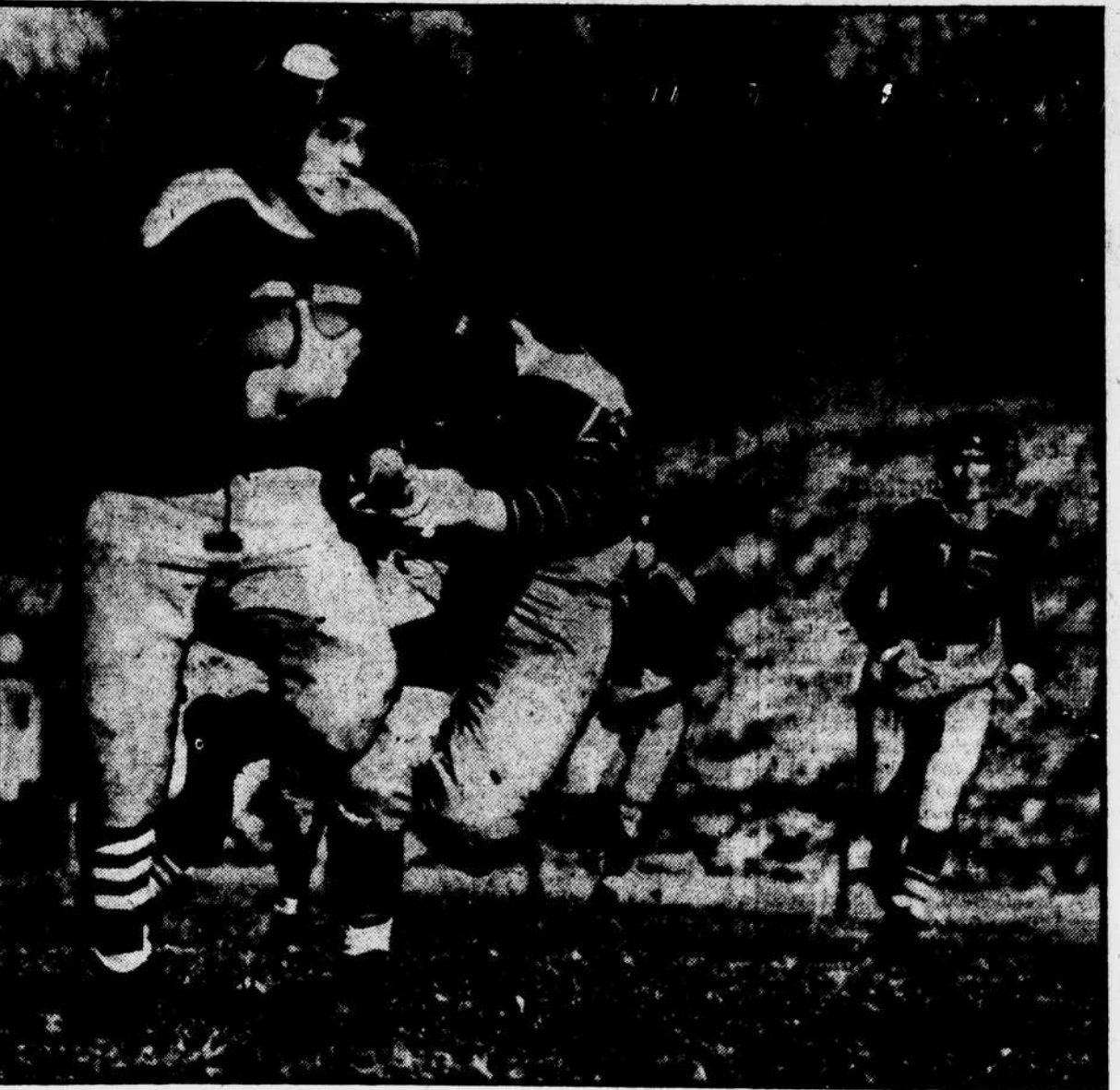
