The Stock Market Reflects the Approaching Holidays.

The chief characteristic of yesterday's stock market was its dulinoss. The session was one of the least interesting and least productive of business of the summer. Prices were well held up, however, and even made fractional gains in most cases, so that as far as the business went it was more in favor of the built than the bears. This was somewhat of a surprise to the street generally, which had looked for further realizing in view of the holiday from today until next Tuesday and because the financial experts generally have said that tomorrow's bank statement will be a peor one. The strength of the market is not mysterious, however. It means, very evidently, that the holders of stocks do not wish to sell at the present level, and that the bears are not willing to take the risk of sedling stocks short. The duliness indicates that for the present, at least, the buyers are not much more numerous than the sedlers. Such a market is generally considered more like, by to give way to an advance than to a decline. It will be interesting to see if the rule proves true in this instance. In any event it is not probable that there will be much of a decline while the strike is unsettled, but on the verge of settlement, while the crep news continues to improve, and while the superb July earnings statements are coming in.

The outcome seems to depend on the insiders.
