### WANT SECTIONS MADE "DRY."

The excise board on Friday will hear petitions submitted by residents of Capitol Hill and Anacostia to have these sections declared residential districts, in which the sale of liquor is prohibited after November 1, when the number of

saloons in the district must be reduced to 300. The Capitol Hill petition is signed by 1,000 residents. It is circulated by the East Washington Civic Association and the Anti-Saloon League. It seeks to include in the "dry" area all of the Ninth and Fifth police precincts. The Anacostia petition bears 230 signatures.

## FOREIGN POSTS FOR LOCAL MEN

### Appointments Abroad Received by A. H. Baldwin and C. W. A. Veditz.

### IN COMMERCIAL WORK

### Former Goes to London, While Latter Has Been Selected to Locate in Paris.

Two of the most important appointments as commercial attaches of the seven announced yesterday by Secretary Redfield, of the Department of Commerce, fell to men well known in Washington. A. H. Baldwin, chief of the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, has been appointed to London, and C. W. A. Veditz, who was one of the men employed in compiling the present tariff law, goes to Paris. All of the places have been filled by men peculiarly fitted to do the work of the new offices.

Five other posts are to be filled as follows: Erwin W. Thompson, to Buenos Ayres; Argentina; Prof. Lincoln Hutchinson, to Rio de Janeiro, Brazil; A. L. Harrington, to Lima, Peru, and Julian H. Arnold, to Peking, China.

### Well Trained for Place.

A. H. Baldwin, who is to be sent to London as the United States commercial attaché, is transferred to that position directly from the Bureau of Foreign and Domestic Commerce, where his experience of four years has given him a training which will be valuable in the new work. He is from Connecticut, and first entered the government service in 1904 in the Bureau of Fisheries. His various activities in the service since then include special service in the Department of Agriculture, the Postoffice Department, the Interior Department and as the government representative at the Portland and Seattle exhibitions.

Mr. Veditz, who goes to Paris, is well known here in Washington as a lecturer on economic subjects and on banking and currency. All of his study has been along that line, beginning with a course in the Wharton School of Finance and Economics of the University of Pennsylvania, where he was an instructor in the studies in economics and political science in Germany, France, Austria, Switzerland and Italy. While abroad he wrote extensively upon his special subjects, returning to America in 1903. Dr. Veditz was engaged alternately as a college professor and an expert investigation for the government. He speaks French and German fluently.

The next important post at Berlin will be filled by Erwin W. Thompson, a North Carolinian. Dr. Hale, who goes to Argentina, has been on the staff of the Pan-American Union since 1906, and has traveled extensively in Latin American countries.

Prof. Lincoln Hutchinson, Ph. D., M. A., who has been appointed to the post at Rio de Janeiro, has made a special study of trade conditions in Central and South American countries for the Department of Commerce in 1906 and 1906. Julian H. Arnold is appointed to the post at Peking, China, by transfer from the position of consul general at Hankow. Mr. Arnold has an admirable record in the consular service and is thoroughly familiar with Chinese conditions.

## NAMING M'COY MAY LEAD PROBE

### Appointment to the District Bench Indicates Conclusion of Wright Inquiry.

### SIDDONS "NEXT" CHOICE

### New Jersey Representative to Leave Congress Immediately Upon Confirmation.

That the nomination yesterday of Representative Walter I. McCoy, of New Jersey, to be a member of the District Supreme bench, is the forerunner of a definite conclusion of the Wright investigation, is the prevalent belief in interested circles here.

A semi-official announcement that District Commissioner Frederick L. Siddons will receive the "next" appointment to the local bench lends color to this belief. On the other hand, Justice Wright has not so far been mentioned in any official report that he had resigned or contemplated such action, and members of the Judiciary Committee of the House refuse to discuss the report.

Mr. McCoy said yesterday that he would resign from the House immediately upon his confirmation by the Senate, in order to assume his duties as early in the October term as possible. The resignation of Representative J. Harry Covington, of Maryland, to the chief justice, becomes effective tomorrow.

### Drops Out of Investigation.

View of his appointment to the bench, Mr. McCoy will take no further part in the Wright investigation, nor will he have a hand in the preparation of any report to the district committee of which he is chairman and which has been conducting the investigation so far. It is considered improbable that the investigation will be carried further, although there yet remain three members of the subcommittee.

### Supported by State Delegation.

Mr. McCoy's candidacy commanded the support of the entire New Jersey delegation in Congress, headed by Representatives Townsend and Tuttle, both of whom have worked particularly hard and most effectively in his interest.

### Efforts to Have Measure Recommended May Lead to Filibuster—Betrays Party, He Says.

Opponents in the Senate of the Clayton bill, if it is carried to that body, are making vigorous efforts to compel the recommendation of the bill with instructions to strengthen it.
