

### CLERKS' MOVEMENT PROGRESSING, SAYS FORMER SENATOR

Mr. Dick Declares Congressmen Are Showing Interest in Campaign.

Former Senator Charles W. Dick, of Ohio, who is at the head of the movement to get more pay, and pension and retirement legislation for the Government clerks, said today the movement was making distinct progress and that there were various evidences of it.

"One evidence is seen in our correspondence," said Senator Dick. "The letters we are receiving from members of Congress show an awakening interest in this question. I believe we are going to be able to obtain desired legislation at the coming session."

General Dick said the committee of

one hundred would hold a meeting about the middle of November, at the Colorado Building. At that time the personnel of the committee will be made public.

The November meeting will be for general discussion and for consideration of how most effectively to bring the matters in which the clerks are concerned to the attention of Congress.

General Dick said a large number of arguments in behalf of the clerks would be submitted to the Civil Service Committees of Congress at the outset of the session. Whether there will be hearings before the committees will rest with the committees themselves.

### Mann Canal Bill to Be Pushed in Congress

The Mann bill for the operation of the Panama Canal and the government of the Canal Zone will be urged for passage in Congress this session by the Administration, it was learned today. This bill has been found satisfactory to the War Department, and, with the approval of these officials, the entire strength of the Administration will be exerted in favor of the measure. The bill was particularly pleasing to the War Department, because it provides for a one-man government of the Zone and emphasizes the military aspect of the canal.

Representative Mann proposes that the President shall have full power to prescribe rates for the use of the canal and to appoint one man to be in sole charge of the operations of the canal and the government of the Zone. Preparations already are being made to secure support in Congress for the Mann measure.

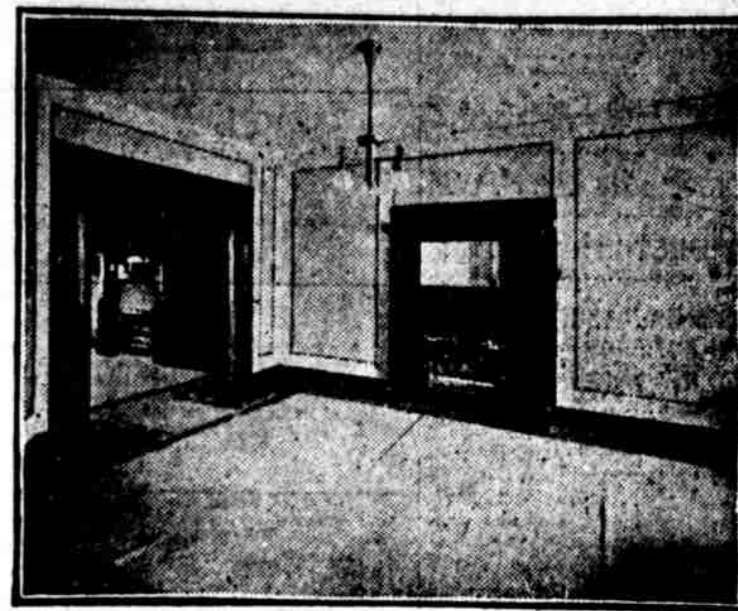

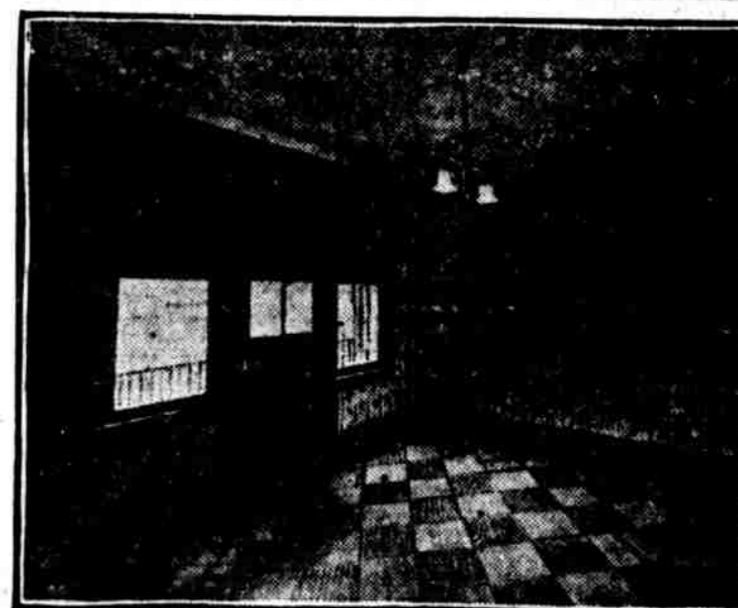
View of Parlor Looking into Dining Room, and Showing the Effect of the Two Massive Oak Pillars Between the Rooms.

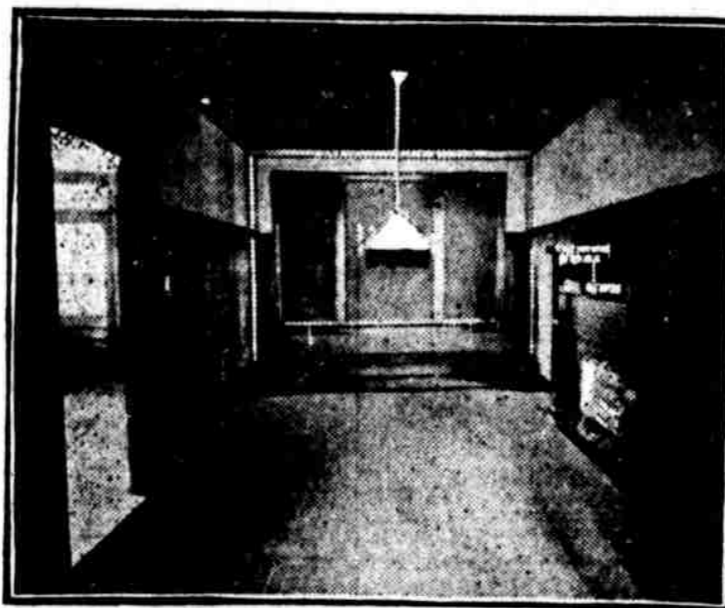
