Many Novelties for the Patrons of the Stage.

Playhouses Renovated and Brightened for the Season.

Patrons of the stage in Washington have before them a season rich in attractions.

Local managers during the summer that is closing have busied themselves in searching for and booking things to please.

Each of the Washington theatres has been renovated and several of them have been beautified.

The Academy of Music has come under the control of a new firm of theatrical managers and hereafter will be known as Hashim's Academy of Music.

High-class vaudeville will hold the boards at the Academy and it is promised that the same character of performance which established the firm at Philadelphia will be produced here.

Of the Messrs. Hashim, N. Hashim, the eldest, is located in New York as the general manager of the firm's enterprises.

Hashim's Academy of Music. The season at Hashim's Academy of Music will be inaugurated with a holiday matinee on Monday, September 3, Labor Day.

At the head of the list are two names known to every vaudevillegoer. They are Pauline Hall and Bettina Gerard.

Among the other names on the inauguration bill are Montgomery and Stone, blackface comedians; Morris' educated peeps; Jess Dandy, Hebrew comedian; Pauline Moran and her pickaninnies; Carl and Brown, the German Emperors; the Maginleys, aerial performers; Elgie Bowen, vocalist; Martinetti and Grossi, musical experts; Kennedy and Quinn, comedians; and the Brothers Abacco, comedy acrobats.

At the daily matinees at Hashim's the entire lower floor and balcony will be 25 cents, all seats reserved, and in the evenings the lower floor will be 50 cents and the balcony 25 cents.

Among the attractions booked at the Columbia Theatre this fall by Manager Joseph Luckett is Innes and his band on October 23.

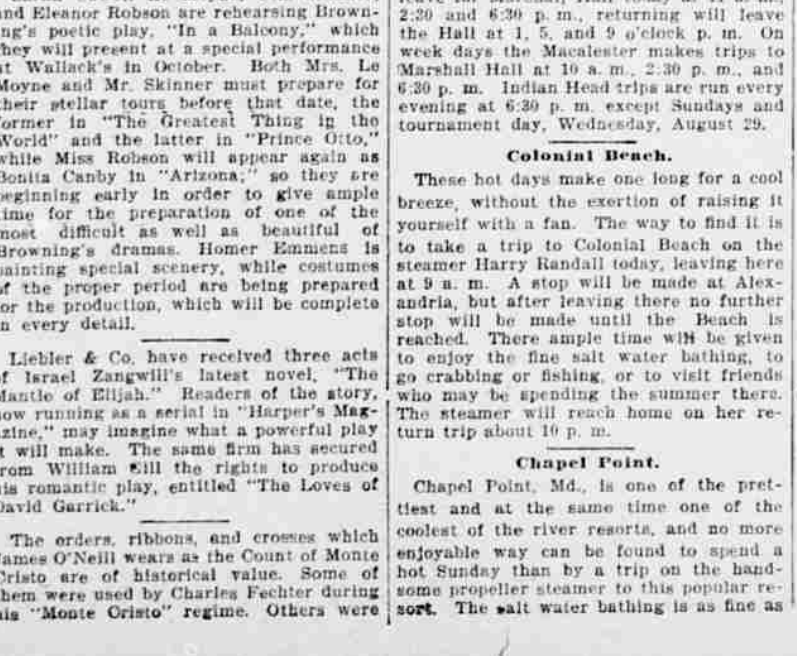
