AN EMINENT MASON DEAD

William R. Singleton Passes Away at an Advanced Age.

Served as Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of the District of Columbia—Completed a Work on the Order of which He Was a Member—Arrangements for the Funeral

William R. Singleton, the Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of Masons of the District of Columbia, died early yesterday morning at his home, 2213 Pennsylvania Avenue northwest. He had been in ill health for over a year, and death came after an active life of eighty-three years. The funeral will take place at the New York Avenue Presbyterian Church, at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon, under the auspices of the Grand Lodge of the District of Columbia. The Rev. Dr. Wallace Radcliffe will officiate, assisted by the Rev. William R. Turner. The funeral exercises of the Knights Templar will also be observed in the church by Washington Commandery No. 1, of which Mr. Singleton was a member. Pentecostal Lodge, No. 23, F. A. A. M., Mount Hope Chapter, R. A. No. 7, and Washington Commandery No. 1, K. T. will act as an escort for the body to Oak Hill cemetery where the Masonic rites will be observed in the interim.

In addition to being one of the oldest Masons in the District of Columbia, William R. Singleton was considered to possess greater knowledge than any other man in the grand lodge concerning all branches and the history of Masonry. For nearly thirty years he acted as secretary of the Grand Lodge of the District, and was actively interested all his life in the progress and work of the order. He was born in Norfolk, Va., October 21, 1818, and received his education at Middlebury, Vt., where he attended college. During his college days he was intimate with the Rev. Byron Sunderland, and their friendship continued during the long period both lived in this city. After leaving college Mr. Singleton felt an inclination for civil engineering and went to St. Louis, where he followed his profession and was engaged in making the

preliminary surveys for the building of the Missouri Pacific Railroad. Later he became State Surveyor of Illinois. He always attributed the severe attacks of rheumatism from which he suffered in his declining years to the effect of his arduous labors in the lowlands of Illinois bordering upon the Mississippi. In 1846 he returned to the East and engaged again in his profession at the Norfolk Navy Yard. In 1855 he was married to Miss Emma Read. William R. Singleton of this city, is one of the children of this union. His second marriage was to Miss Mary B. Frisby, of Baltimore, and one child of this union is still living, Mrs. J. B. Berry, at whose home Mr. Singleton lived for many years, and where he died. In the early fifties he supervised the engineering work of the construction of the navy yard at Pensacola, Fla. Later he removed to Baltimore and in the year 1863 came to Washington and was employed in the engineering branch of the War Department, in which capacity he had charge of the building of forts about this city during the last years of the civil war.

At the cessation of hostilities he was transferred to the Interior Department and made an examiner of patents, which position he resigned in 1875, when he entered business as a patent solicitor. Shortly before this time he was elected Grand Secretary of the Grand Lodge of the District and retained an active interest in all affairs of the lodge as it grew in strength and numbers during the years he acted in that capacity. One great service that he rendered was the completion of a work on Masonry which had been left unfinished by the death of the late Alford Mackay.

A Two-hundred Century Kirmess.
The Twentieth Century Kirmess, an enterprise somewhat on the order of the conventional church fair, will be opened under the auspices of the congregation of the Lincoln Memorial Church, at Eleventh and R Streets Monday evening. Senator Mason of Illinois has promised to present and will deliver the opening address. Representative White of North Carolina will also speak. The kirmess will continue every week day until March 15.

Harness Theft Cases Continued.
The case of Charles F. Hill, who is charged with receiving stolen property, in having brought a double set of harness, valued at \$83, which he is said to have known had been stolen, has been continued until Tuesday. The harness had been stolen from Martin A. Curtis. This is the first of several cases that it is said will be brought against Hill. The same continuation was granted in the cases of George Jackson, Thomas Brown, and Frank Dorsey, all released, who are charged with horsestealing and the larceny of the harness in question.

Justice Barnard yesterday sentenced Howard Minto to imprisonment in the penitentiary for a period of two years. The prisoner was charged with grand larceny and when called for trial on Wednesday he pleaded guilty to the indictment.

Fined for Stealing an Orange.
Frank Johnson, a little colored boy, was yesterday in the Police Court sentenced to pay a fine of \$2 or go to jail for thirty days for the larceny of an orange from Joseph Lorenz. He was sent to the House of Detention until Monday to give his mother an opportunity to pay his fine.

Death of Waldo G. Perry.
