Fire Damages A-Sub At Honolulu; 2 Missing

HONOLULU, June 15 (AP)—A flash fire hit the nuclear submarine USS Sargo at Pearl Harbor yesterday but was extinguished in an hour by half submerging the 2,500-ton craft. Two men were unofficially reported missing.

The fire, which broke out in the stern or torpedo room, at no time endangered the submarine, the Navy said. Damage was extensive, however, and the Sargo is expected to be dry docked, the Navy said.

The after-stern, or torpedo compartment, was immediately flooded and the stern half of the ship was submerged shortly after the fire broke out at 5:30 p.m. Hawaiian Standard Time (11:30 p.m. Washington time). The submarine was tied alongside the dock.

The fire was attributed by a Navy spokesman to a rupture in the liquid oxygen line near the after torpedo room. The submarine was taking on a supply of liquid oxygen.

The room was immediately sealed off and flooded after the blaze broke out. Oxygen for breathing purposes is brought to the dock in compressed liquid form because it is easier to store, but is put aboard in gaseous form in large bottles.

Officially, the Navy said early today no determination has yet been made of casualties.

But a spokesman said: "There could be two crew members unaccounted for." He added that no determination could be made until water had been pumped from the flooded torpedo chamber.

This was not expected until later in the day.

The spokesman was unable to say how many men were on board at the time of the fire. The submarine normally carries a complement of 111 officers and men.

One member of the Navy

Public Information Office said he heard "a small whoomp" when the fire broke out. The office is about half a mile from the submarine. "I could see black smoke billowing from the sub," he said.

Two fire boats immediately sprayed foam over the smoking vessel, while flames shot out briefly from the stern room. The area was immediately cleared. Firemen fought the blaze from the dock. Then the torpedo room was sealed off and the stern half of the ship submerged.

The spokesman said there was "absolutely no danger from an explosion in the nuclear reactor compartment." Thailand's King Bhumibol was to have boarded the submarine this morning for a four-hour cruise around Oahu. The King was to have lunched aboard with his host, Admiral Herbert G. Hopwood, commander of the United States Pacific Fleet.

Instead, the Thai monarch will cruise aboard the guided-missile submarine USS Growler. The Sargo won fame after a historic under-ice winter exploration cruise of the Arctic basin, including the North Pole. It returned to its Pearl Harbor base on March 3 after spending a total of 31 days under ice. It surfaced 20 times through ice up to 3 feet thick, and logged over 6,000 miles.

Its skipper, Lt. Comdr. John H. Nicholson, 35, of Oakland, Calif., was awarded the Legion of Merit for the under-ice cruise.

ONE IN 22 TAKES ISSUE

Kennedy Offers Ideas To Friendly Audience

Senator Kennedy's major foreign policy speech was received in an atmosphere that was antiseptically non-political and almost, but not quite, non-partisan.

Only the crowded galleries gave hint that this was an important step for the Democratic front-runner, who was attempting to prove that he can cope with Soviet Premier Khrushchev and further, that if he cannot match either Mr. Khrushchev or his presidential rivals in years, he is their equal in ideas.

Opposition Absent

None of his opponents was present. Majority Leader Johnson was in Texas straightening out affairs at home base. Vice President Nixon was absent from the chair. Senator Symington, Democrat of Missouri, was represented by an aide among the many staff members gathered around the edge of the chamber.

The Senator's reply to his critics was delayed by a cheerful scuffle between Republicans and Democrats over the appointment of monitors who would make sure that presidential candidates got equal time on radio and television. Minority Leader Dirksen heatedly contended that he was "against watchdogs until there was doggy to be watched."

Finally, an hour behind

schedule, the Senator took the floor and read his collection of reflections on what is wrong with our foreign policy. As he read, seeking and achieving no oratorical effects, an aide distributed copies of his remarks to the 17 Democratic Senators who heard him out. There were never more than five Republicans present.

At once, the Senator widened the gap between himself and his most formidable contender, Majority Leader Johnson. Senator Johnson has foreclosed criticism of the U-2 incident and has backed the President all the way from Paris to Tokyo. Vice President Nixon echoed the Johnson sentiments about the summit collapse when he, too, demanded over the week end that Mr. Khrushchev apologize to the United States.

Senator Kennedy found no apologies for our department overseas: "As a substitute for policy, Mr. Eisenhower has tried smiling at the Russians; our State Department has tried frowning at them; and Mr. Nixon has tried both. None have succeeded."

Democrats Laudatory

When he finished, Acting Majority Leader Mansfield of Montana told the youthful Senator exactly what he most wished to hear. He praised his "maturity." Senator Mansfield also pointed out the tri-

bute of the "sober attention" of his colleagues which had been paid to Senator Kennedy, who is probably the only man in America who rears a splendid crop of hair and a flat waistline.

A former rival on the campaign trail, Senator Humphrey, Democrat of Minnesota, gave a generous, judicious appraisal of Senator Kennedy's utterances. Being in a position to know, Senator Humphrey said he was familiar with the material, but that the speech represented "a kind of comprehensive, integrated thinking" on foreign policy.

Other Democratic colleagues rallied round with the usual kindly, "Would-not-the-Senator-agree?" kind of question.

By this time the Republican ranks had thinned and Senator Capehart of Indiana was the sole representative of the power and the glory of the G. O. P.

Capehart Unimpressed

He lumbered to his feet, looking disgruntled.

"I didn't find anything new in the speech," he grumbled.

Even the problems were old, inherited from a Democratic administration, complained Senator Capehart.

"I can't compliment the Senator," said Senator Capehart. "He covered the entire waterfront, promised something to everybody in the world. Frankly, that kind of a speech leaves false hopes in the minds of the people of the world. . . . That is what got us into trouble in the first place—promises."

Senator Kennedy, disposed of the dissenter with ease.

"I am complimented," he said, "by the fact that the Senator has not complimented me."
