

CHICAGO DESTROYED.

At a meeting of the Chicago Typographical Union, held at 15 South Canal street, President John M. Farquhar in the chair and Mr. E. J. Laferriere Secretary, the following resolutions were adopted...

The following has been received by Mayor Mason: I am authorized to tender to the Holy Family church, corner of Adams and 12th streets, and also the basement of their church on 12th street, with such assistance as may be necessary.

The public are cautioned not to make use of water from any of the drains or pipes which have been deposited in the water drains, as it will be dangerous to health and water from the West Side...

The headquarters of the General Relief Committee are at the Congregational Church, corner of Second and Madison streets. All of the Public Schools will be open as usual...

The homeless and hungry can find food and shelter and an abundance of water, at either of the public school buildings, and at all the churches...

The old Soldiers' Home, on Douglas place, is open for the reception of all who may be homeless in the South Division.

All organizations may, through their respective committees, draw for supplies on the committee to be organized at the corner of 12th and State streets.

The city of Peoria has subscribed \$10,000 for the relief of sufferers.

The Committee of Chicago members of the Common Council of Cincinnati arrived in this city at 10 o'clock last evening.

In the midst of a calamity without parallel in the world's history, looking upon the ashes of thirty years' accumulations, the people of this once beautiful city have resolved that CHICAGO SHALL RISE AGAIN.

Thanks to the blessed charity of the good people of the United States, we shall not suffer from hunger or nakedness in this trying time.

Already contracts have been made for rebuilding some of the burned blocks, and the clearing away of the debris will begin to-day.

The great fire has prostrated business. There was no buying or selling to-day, except to feed the hungry.

The Chicago relief committee is organized at the corner of 12th and State streets.

One of the points of greatest interest is to know the condition of the banks. On this point it is well understood that on Saturday night the twenty leading banks of the city held an average amount of cash means, viz: currency, bonds, and New York exchange, equal to 35 per cent of their aggregate deposits.

The National Bank vaults were opened yesterday, and everything found intact. The most important point, however, is the "bills receivable."

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The records of deeds were burned up in the Court House, but the indexes were saved, and the abstract firms, Shortall & Hoard and Chase Brothers, have saved their abstract books complete.

Trains are arriving almost every hour laden with provisions, under charge of committees from neighboring cities. There should be sub-committees of our local relief organization to meet them, and direct the disposition of their supplies.

We understand that all the railroads take passengers free of the city to the neighboring towns and country. The more who avail themselves of this opportunity to get away for a period the better.
