The Diversion in Front—Resume of the Movement—Topography of the Country—Our Victory Assured—Advance on Resaca.

CAMP SOUTH-WEST OF RESACA, GA., May 13, 1864.

The attempt to carry the enemy's position by assault in front was abandoned after the reconnaissance of the 23d A. C. in the valley west of Rocky Face ridge on Monday.

On the evening of the 12th, the order was received for the 23d Army Corps to move via Tunnel Hill Gap, through Snake Creek Gap, round to the right.

round in a curve, in the middle of which is a ford. Our losses were not heavy during the afternoon, but there was a heavy volley on our left in the direction of Dalton, about 7 p. m., the results of which I have not learned.

The forenoon was occupied in skirmishing with the advance line of the enemy, in which a few of our men only were wounded. Howard, with the 4th Corps, occupied Dalton this morning, and the cars are now running to that place.

The secret of their leaving Snake Creek Gap open now begins to be revealed. They have been occupying open defensive works around Resaca for six months, and as in many, too many, cases heretofore, we are now in front of them, in the very place of their own selection.

During the afternoon the troops were rapidly put in position facing that of the enemy. Gen. Thomas had moved to the right, and the 23d Army Corps, under Schofield, joined to the left, facing toward Tilton and Resaca.

Gen. Sherman had a narrow escape from a shell which exploded in the field to the left of the Rebel center, where he, with Gen. Thomas, was watching the progress of the battle.

At 2 o'clock p. m., the 4th Corps are seen moving from right to left to the support of, or to relieve the 23d Corps. They move by the left flank, under cover of the hills, upon the double-bank, and in excellent order.

and, during the remainder of the day, kept quite heavily. The 14th Corps skirmished with the enemy to the right of the 23d Corps during the greater part of the day.

The morning was smoky, and the skirmishing was delayed until about 8 o'clock when the opposing lines began the day's diversion.

During the night the enemy made good his escape, leaving in his precipitate flight all his killed and wounded in our hands.

Killed and Wounded Twenty-Third Army Corps. One hundred and eleven Ohio Volunteers. Gen. Thomas, 500 killed. Gen. Sherman, 500 killed.
