President Receives Commander Of Grand Army at White House

Veterans Invest National Capital for Forty-ninth Annual Encampment—Five Thousand Aged Fighters Are Officially Registered at Camp Emery.

The Grand Army of the Republic has invested the National Capital, thousands of veterans from all sections of the country have mobilized here for the forty-ninth annual encampment of the organization, the official festivities of which were commenced yesterday morning. The city is all astir with enthusiasm and patriotic feeling. Union Station is thronged with the incoming army of veterans and other visitors. The high tide of the influx was reached yesterday, although the crowds will continue to pour into the city.

Pennsylvania avenue and the other thoroughfares of the downtown section yesterday were crowded with aged men in uniforms. Camp Emery, G. Emery, headquarters of the organization, was thronged by thousands. The spirit was that of fifty years ago; that of the days of the Grand Review, when the victorious Union troops assembled here to pass in stately procession before the President of the United States.

VETERANS ENTERTAINED BY PENSION OFFICIALS

Judiciary Square Building Lavishly Decorated in Honor of G. A. R.

Commissioner of Pensions Gaylord M. Saltzger, Deputy Commissioner of Pensions E. C. Tietman and employees in the Pension Bureau have made elaborate preparations to entertain and impart information to the veterans and their friends during the encampment. The Pension Building is lavishly decorated, and on the main floor the commissioner and officers of the Bureau may be found at all times to extend a helping hand to those in need of aid. A special force of employees has been specially detailed to give information to the veterans and their widows concerning their individual pension claims which are pending or for some cause have been acted upon adversely. A cordial welcome awaits all visitors and every convenience for their comfort has been provided, including a hospital, with physicians and trained nurses in attendance.

Yesterday thousands were entertained for two hours by a concert by the United States Marine Band in the court of the building. This probably was the only opportunity for the army of visitors to hear this famous band in concert.

BULGARIA'S TONE MILD.

Pledges Mobilization Will Not Injure Interests of Russia.

Petrograd, Sept. 27.—(M. J. Madjarov, the Bulgarian minister to Russia, has assured Foreign Minister Sazonov that the mobilization of the Bulgarian army is not intended for an offensive movement that will menace Russian interests in the Balkans. The pledge of the Bulgarian minister is most significant in view of the fact that Russia entered the war in defense of Serbia.

Probably the comrade never knew his nurse, or lost her after the war.

NAVAL SPECTACLE IS WATCHED BY THOUSANDS

A naval touch to the Grand Army Encampment was added yesterday when a string of war vessels steamed into Georgetown channel and dropped anchor off the shore of Potomac Park. Thousands were attracted to the water front during the afternoon, a score of launches darting over the river at full speed to accommodate the sightseers who would board the battleships.

That Col. William R. Drew, the second in command of the Second District of Columbia Volunteer Infantry, is present at this encampment probably is due to the fact that he carried a diary in which he noted his life at Antietam, was a rebel bullet, flying straight for his heart, lodging in its pages.
