

INSURANCE FIRM BACKS BUCKWARD'S NEW BUILDING HERE

Another Demonstration of Confidence in Washington Realty Operations.

Stocks Generally Easier, Lessening Trading Radius LOCAL SECURITIES WERE AGAIN SLOW WITH BONDS FAVORED

NEW YORK, Aug. 15.—The action of the season centered very largely in Union Pacific shares, most of the room traders devoting their operations entirely to this security, hence its irregularity and range of 3/4 points with more or less frequent changes within the limits noted.

The sharp rally yesterday afternoon was not based on any favorable action whatsoever, nothing more than the covering of the extended short line. London came fractionally better, evidently from buying orders placed from this side of the Atlantic, for effect, as England, just at this time is in no position to take advantage of the happenings that go to depress our market—she has trouble enough of her own to occupy her attention and invest her capital.

The wise men of the street have the idea that the rise that came into the market now and then, particularly the rally late Monday, are inspired by a desire to create strong spots for liquidation purposes. Hence they fight shy of following the rallies, urging the buying of stocks on the weak spots and the liquidation on strength.

With the immediate opening of the Pacific was dropped a point and then 3/4 additional. Then followed a rally that carried it back practically to within 1/4 of yesterday's closing.

There was nothing in the news of the morning to cause any particular attention. Some observers declared that the market is not high by any means considering money rates, etc. The Canadian Pacific showed a surplus of \$1,173,242, which was carried forward.
