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PROBE TO FOLLOW SUFFRAGE PARADE

Investigation of Police on
Charge of Negligence to
Be Made.

SENATE TAKES ACTION

Maj. Sylvester Probably Will Be
Called on the Carpet to
Explain.

The Senate yesterday took official cognizance of the negligence of the metropolitan police department. Senator Knute Nelson of Minnesota, after a bitter verbal attack on the department on the floor of the chamber, introduced a resolution looking to an immediate investigation. After Nelson's resolution was adopted, Senator Wesley L. Jones of Washington made a speech in which he scored the department, and offered a resolution, similar to Nelson's, and which most likely will be adopted, which will mean that Sylvester will be called on the Senatorial carpet.

Representative Richard Pearson Hobson, on the floor of the House, also attacked Sylvester and the police department, and stated that he would demand an investigation.

"It was disgraceful," said Hobson. "I was told by a woman that a ruffian climbed onto a float and insulted her daughter."

"Her daughter ought to have been at home," remarked Representative Mann, and immediately there was an uproar in the House over Mann's rally.

"The gentleman ought to be ashamed of himself," shouted Baker, of California, and it was several minutes before rebukes directed against Mann could be silenced.

Sylvester Is Denounced.

The suffragettes yesterday denounced Sylvester in no mild terms. They assert they told him in advance that the crowds might prove unruly, and requested that he demand the presence of troops to reinforce his small squad of bluecoats.

The women go even further by saying that Sylvester is a radical anti-suffragist, that he was against the holding of a parade, refused the first request for permission, and later gave it only when forced to do so by higher officials.

Those who witnessed the disgraceful scenes on Monday when the crowd broke through the ropes and literally mobbed the hiking suffragettes, say the police stood idly by while the rowdies mauled the women who walked from New York to this city.

"The actual conditions permitted during the parade yesterday were a disgrace," said Senator Jones, in his speech. "I am reliably informed that the police were negligent."

Senator Nelson declared that the apathy of the police Monday, when the paraders were being mistreated, was "a most disgraceful affair," and that it discredited the police of the city.

Maj. Sylvester wrote a letter in his defense to the Commissioners yesterday. He stated that the police had done their best to maintain order, and blamed the whole disturbance upon the breaking of a cable in front of the Willard Hotel. He also said that he had too few men at his command.

"TRUST BREAKERS" WILL BE RETAINED

Department of Justice Officials Have
Many Cases to Prosecute
to Finish.

CHANGES WILL BE FEW

Practical immunity for many of the forty portfolios now held by Republicans in the Department of Justice was forced upon the Wilson administration yesterday by the press and importance of the work before Uncle Sam's Republican "trust busters."

Litigations against the Steel Trust, the Bathing Trust, Harvester Trust, Moving Picture Trust, Keystone Watch Trust, Coffee Trust, and the prosecution of the United States Shoe Machinery Company and the Southern Pacific Railroad Company in California have all been carried on by Republican attorneys in the Taft administration, and it therefore seems certain that a large percentage of the lawyers employed in the department will hold office, despite the popularly supposed efficacy of the spoils system.

The wholesale dismissal of these men by the new Attorney General, it was said yesterday, would seriously cripple the government's cases in litigation. Among those mentioned as probable hold-overs from the Taft administration are Judge John M. Dickinson, government prosecutor of the Steel Trust; Attorney Edwin S. Grover, in charge of the cases against the Harvester Trust, Moving Picture Trust, and a number of other important suits; Special Assistants Kercher and Chantland, who in connection with government attorneys in several large cities, have been engaged in prosecuting the Watch and Coffee Trusts, and Attorney Greig and Caldwell, who have had charge of the cases against the United States Shoe Machinery Company and the Southern Pacific Railroad.

To this list may be added several Federal district attorneys in various judicial districts throughout the country.
