IN HOSPITAL  
FOR HEALING**

**Ward "M" Has Boys Physi-  
cally Broken, But Men-  
tally Alert.**

"Ward M" is exactly like all of the score of other wooden buildings that form the new part of Walter Reed Hospital here, and its patients wear the same kind of pajamas as do the residents of "B" or "H."

Only in the other wards you will observe groups strolling up and down screened verandas, or lolling in comfortable chairs, whereas in "M" they keep mostly to their cots. It is the eastern in the world, you know, to walk and smoke if you've left one or both legs of the best part of your arms back in France—which is what some of "Ward M" boys did.

You can learn, however, that is what the seriously wounded American leads, the first contingent from the front, are now doing—learning to live all over again with what is left. "Men minus" they are physically, but morally and mentally they're "men plus."

**Boys Used Up.**  
The very contact with these badly used up boys was an inspiration. For they've come back with bruised, broken bodies, but with a spirit which scintillates whatever it touches. Not all of the 200 wounded fighters at the Walter Reed hospital are permanently crippled. Not even Aubrey McCloud, of the Fifth Base Hospital unit, who left both his legs over there, the result of an air raid. McCloud can propel himself in a wheelchair, and as soon as the tender stumps heal he will be able to walk on artificial legs without crutches.

McCloud, who lived in Norwood, O., went over with the Harvard medical unit and became a stretcher-bearer around Ypres. The Boche aviator "got" him while he was asleep.

**Companions Killed.**  
Two companions were killed, McCloud would have "gone West," too, save for the generosity of an English sergeant, who gave the Ohio boy nearly a quart of his blood, for which he asked only a furlough back to "Blighly."

"Hopelless?" "Hopelless!" It would have made the tears come to have seen McCloud's face. It was booming. "Why should I be hopeless? Did they leave me my two good arms? Look at 'em!"

"Don't get the idea that the fellows who had a bit of hard luck over there are going to whine. There's too much to live for. We have come through the worst of it, and we're going to keep right on. The worst thing of all is that we can't go back and fight."

"It's all right, what we got." It's for God and honor, he said, and he smiled an infinitely beautiful smile. Do you wonder that it was an inspiration?

**"BALTIMORE'S OWN"  
ARRIVES IN FRANCE**  
312th Infantry, Trained at Camp Meade, Safe Over.  
Baltimore, Md., July 14.—Members of the 312th Infantry, Seventy-ninth Division, are in France.

The first news that "Baltimore's Own" had arrived safely was contained in a letter received by Mr. and Mrs. William H. Eabelling, 4013 Harford avenue, from their son, William V. Eabelling. The message was brief and no mention was made as to just how many of the men had arrived or when they sailed.

The 312th was the pioneer Baltimore regiment at Camp Meade and was made up almost entirely of selected men from this city. The arrival of the 312th Regiment marks the third large contingent of Marylanders to reach France. The first was the 117th Trench Mortar Battery, and a few weeks ago word was received of the landing of the 115th Infantry, which was made up of men from the old First and Fifth Maryland regiments.

**Food Taken from Ships

More than 200,000 pounds of food was cut from the food requisition of vessels in New York harbor from June 1 to 21 through the action of the War Trade Board, and in many cases the food actually was taken off the ships after being stored.

PRINCE'S PLEA  
FOR HUN KING**

**Reactionaries Argue That  
Monarchy Better Than  
Republic There.**

Stockholm, July 14.—Finnish reactionary (White Guard) newspapers are again appearing, under German and White Guard protection. The leading Red Guard paper in Finland, the Helsingfors Tyomies, has been suppressed.

All the papers now allowed to appear declare for a monarchy instead of a republic in Finland. One, the Svenskt Tidning, says:

"A German prince is the only possible sovereign for Finland."

Most other papers are openly pro-German, but make no suggestion as to the nationality of the coming king.

In Abo, second Finnish city, a monarchist association has been formed, which has issued an appeal blaming the absence of a permanent head to the state for the Russian upheaval, and pleading for a monarchial arrangement similar to Sweden.

Opposition to the monarchy plan is certain from the Finnish Socialists and the defeated Red Guards who return to their country. Opposition to a German monarch is also developing among Swedish Liberals, who are circulating propaganda in Finland against the Germanizing of that country and the choice of a German King.

**Finnish Eat Bark Bread.**  
London, July 14.—People in North Finland are eating not only bark bread, but straw bread, sometimes containing unground pieces of straw half an inch long. The Finnish Senate has cut the ordinary bread ration in half, except that of manual laborers, which is cut only one-sixth.

Senator Cummins made a worthwhile appearance before the Iowa State convention of Republicans the other day. But the report fails to show that any considerable amount of real politics was thrown into the arena by him. He must be overlooking a party bet, somewhere.

Mr. Davis has not yet replied to Senator Hitchcock's answer to his "politics during the war" question. It is said at the Capitol, however, that several of the leaders are conferring now over a reply and that it may be ready soon. The importance of getting it "just right" is readily recognized.

All of the honors of the Roosevelt family are not going to be hoarded by the Colonel himself. The way his youngsters are performing abroad it appears that Dad will have to share some of them with his sons. We'll wager he will not be in the least jealous over this, either.

In choosing to oppose Senator Walsh for re-election Jeannette Rankin chose the lesser of two evils we hear.
