Mr. McAdoo's Resignation. William G. McAdoo has resigned as a member of President Wilson's Cabinet. He not only leaves his position as Secretary of the Treasury, but Railroad Administrator and more than a half dozen other responsibilities which he has borne with great credit to himself and his country.

During the past year and a quarter, Mr. McAdoo supervised the raising of nearly \$7,000,000,000 in liberty loans, about \$1,000,000,000 in war savings stamps, and the collection of more than \$2,000,000,000 in taxes. In that time he also directed the loaning of about \$8,000,000,000 to the allied nations.

We regret that Mr. McAdoo's explanation of resignation is not more convincing. As to his health, we believe that he could so shape his present affairs to take a vacation for several months. As to his personal finances, it is an injustice that a man should be compelled to pauperize himself through the holding of high public office.

We recall Mr. McAdoo's engineering feat of building the Hudson Tubes. We do not know how much he was paid for that work, but no one will dispute that he earned more than \$12,000 per year. Brilliant as Mr. McAdoo's work has been as a Cabinet official, he resigns his post with a haze hanging about several issues.

SHIP PROGRAM OUT, SAYS PIEZ Vice President of Fleet Corporation States Economy Is Watchword.

Limited ship construction has been the policy of the Emergency Fleet Corporation since September, Charles Piez, vice-president of the Emergency Fleet Corporation stated last night in answer to the resolution of Senator Harding who quoted that the Emergency Fleet would need 200,000 workers during the coming year.

Proposes Ship Bill. Within a month of the outbreak of the war he proposed the ship purchase bill, which was filibustered to death in Congress, but which brought about the United States Shipping Board in 1917. This measure, like many others, indicates the vision of the man Mr. McAdoo, by conference, brought aid to foreign exchange, to the cotton growers and exporters, to the grain producers, and shortly after the war began proposed the "amalgamate evening dress," but it will be many years.

Who Will Succeed Treasurer McAdoo? Speculation on the man who will be named to succeed William Gibbs McAdoo as Secretary of the Treasury was general last night in hotel lobbies and the foyers of the clubs. The official circles, however, could not venture the name of any one man as the apparent selection of the President.

My Dear Mr. Secretary: I was not unprepared for your letter of the fourteenth, because you had more than once, of course, discussed with me the circumstances which have long made it a serious personal sacrifice for you to remain in office.
