Life Without "Suds" Is Dreadful, Say New York Scrub Women.

New York, July 25.—Scrubwomen in two large Manhattan skyscrapers threw down their mops this week. They wanted more money and they wanted more beer. For years New York has given a thought to everything—except their scrubwomen. They emerge from their lodgings shortly after midnight and bowl to work in express trains, sleepy-eyed and haggard. From then on until after dawn they whiten tiled floors of ornate office buildings.

RED CROSS WORK IN SERBIA TOLD

Miss Cornelia Hill, Just Returned, Tells of Improving Conditions.

"Conditions were improving in Serbia when I left there," said Miss Cornelia Hill, 120 Sixteenth street, northwest, who has just returned to this city from France. "I was among the first American women to reach Monastir, the second largest Serbian city. This was after the signing of the armistice, and I was stationed there from December 10, last year, to March 6, this year. When I arrived in Monastir there were only two Red Cross women doctors besides myself. I was placed in charge of the clothing department, which consisted, at that time, of ten sewing girls, mostly Bulgarians, and three sewing machines. I was distributing clothing to men, women and children. Conditions were bad. There was a great deal of poverty. Half the town had been destroyed by shells and by fire. When I left Monastir the men were going back to their trades. The American Red Cross is feeding 18,000 people in the district. Capt. Lanning McFarland, in charge of activities, although only 21 years of age, was a wonder. Leaving Monastir I went to Salonika and distributed clothing there until April 20, when I was ordered to return home. I joined the Red Cross in September 1918, and left for Bordeaux on the Rochambeau. Upon arriving there I went to Paris and was sent to Rome in the bureau of personnel, landing in that city October 7. I remained in Italy until Thanksgiving Eve, and was then instructed to report at Salonika."

U. S. RESUMES TRADE WITH WHOLE WORLD

Commerce has been resumed with every quarter of the globe, the United States Shipping Board announced yesterday. America has engaged in the general commerce of the seas, the board stated, 829 ships, of 4,283,973 deadweight tons, exclusive of more than 2,500,000 tons still in war service and in overseas civilian relief work. Of these, it was stated, 174 steamers, of 1,351,305 deadweight tons, already are employed in trade routes, which have been given regular cargo liner service.

Wathena, Kan., July 25.—Ranson Lindsay, of Leona, Kan., objected to the attentions of a married man, W. Sanford, to his wife. When Sanford appeared at the Mansfield home Sunday night with a gun, knowing his intention of taking Mrs. Mansfield away with him, Ranson shot him. Sanford kept him in the house, daring him to come out at the risk of his life. Being unarmed, Mansfield waited until Sanford drew a gun and then rushed out with a scale weight which he had found inside, and beat Sanford over the head with it, then took his gun from him and beat him with the stock. Sanford was taken unconscious to a St. Joseph hospital, where no hopes are held for his recovery.

OUTING AT BEACH FOR REED BOYS

Wounded Soldiers to Be Guests of Railway at Chesapeake.

Boxing bouts, crutch races, one-legged races and wheel-chair races will be among the unique athletic events to be participated in by wounded soldiers from Walter Reed Hospital on an outing to be given tomorrow at Chesapeake Beach by the Chesapeake Beach Railway. Arrangements are being handled by Mrs. C. R. Zappone, known as "The Mother of Walter Reed Hospital." For four months Mrs. Zappone has been a member of the staff of the War Camp Community Service, detailed to entertainment work at the hospital. Prior to that time she engaged independently in the same work for sixteen months. The party which will visit the beach tomorrow will leave the District line at 2:30 o'clock and will remain at the resort until 8. The boys will be transported to and from Chesapeake Junction by the Red Cross Motor Corps. Special cars will take them to and from the beach. At the resort they will be treated to a big dinner, furnished by the Business Men's Association of Chesapeake Beach. Cigarettes also will be supplied.
