DANIELS BACK; ON JOB TODAY

Secretary Takes Only Day's Rest Before Resuming Charge of Dept.

Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels, who has been with the Pacific fleet for about six weeks, returned to Washington this evening from Seattle.

Mr. Daniels will resume charge at the Navy Department today and meantime devoted yesterday to rest. One of the special objects of Mr. Daniels in visiting the West coast was to observe personally where the navy establishment needed strengthening all the way up from the Panama Canal to Puget Sound. The most important of his objects was to come to a conclusion as to where a new primary base for the fleet should be located.

"On these questions," he said, "I shall have to make a report first to Congress."

The opinion is still as strong here as it was before Daniels went out West that the great naval base of the Pacific fleet will be at San Francisco. It is known that the Naval Affairs Committee of the House is anxious to get a report from Secretary Daniels and it also probably will call him before it for the expression of his opinions at length.

The news that Secretary Daniels had arrived was soon known here and he had many visitors notwithstanding his day of rest. His two sons also came here to see him. Lieut. Josephus Daniels, Jr., M. C. who is secretary and treasurer of the Raleigh News and Observer, and Jonathan Daniels, who came here from Richmond.

J. H. ROSSETER TO QUIT SHIP BOARD

Director of Operations Division Asks to Be Relieved December 1.

Considerable speculation is being indulged in by those interested in the Shipping Board over who will succeed Henry M. Robinson, one of two commissioners in the Shipping Board who resigned September 15.

It is officially announced that the successor will not be named until President Wilson returns from his trip. No names have been brought to the front in this connection, but it is generally known that Mr. Robinson's successor will be a Pacific Coast man and a Republican.

It is also admitted that the man who succeeds Mr. Robinson will not be a shipping man, but probably a big business man.

Mr. Robinson was formerly the representative of the Shipping Board at Paris. He has only been in Washington a short time, living at 2029 Connecticut avenue.

Another who will resign from the Shipping Board is J. H. Rosseter, director of division of operations. He has asked to leave December 1. It is announced that a naval officer probably will be named to take his place.

Both Mr. Rosseter and Mr. Robinson are California men.

Officers Think Daniels Will Urge Wage Raise

Officers and men of the army and navy confidently expect that Secretary of the Navy Daniels, who returned yesterday from his Pacific trip, will urgently recommend to Congress the necessity of increasing the pay of the officers and men of the services, who are vainly trying to make both ends meet on pay rates established eleven years ago. It is believed that Mr. Daniels' action will take the form of recommending the passage of the Stinson bill, recently introduced into the House, the passage of which was strongly urged on Saturday by Secretary of War Baker, in a letter to the chairman of the House Military Committee.

Two Robbed and Beaten A Pretty Woman's Game

Police are searching for the assailants of George Nolan, 475 H street southwest, and John R. Tobin of Alexandria, Va., both of whom were knocked down and robbed early yesterday morning.

Nolan told the police he was dragged into an alley near his home, assaulted, and robbed of \$25 by three negroes.

Tobin was robbed of \$150 shortly after Nolan, on Seventh street southwest, near F street, by two negroes. He also was beaten up. The police believe the same gang committed both robberies.

12 NEW INFLUENZA CASES REPORTED

Twelve cases of "Spanish influenza" were reported yesterday. Dr. William C. Fowler, District health officer, stated last night. This brings the total number of cases in the District up to forty.

In the meantime the forces of the health department are being held in readiness for a possible widespread epidemic during the next few months. Although no serious developments are expected, the District is certain to have a number of cases of influenza, the health officer declared.

Name New Legion Post For Col. Roosevelt

The name "Theodore Roosevelt" was selected unanimously for the new American Legion Post, formed yesterday at the Y. M. H. A., Eleventh street and Pennsylvania avenue.

Julius Peyer, donated a banner inscribed with the post's official designation, and the following officers were elected:

Commander, E. Jablons; senior vice commander, S. G. Zuckerman; junior vice commander, J. L. Zassa; recording adjutant, J. Landow; financial adjutant, J. Goldsmith; and financial officer, S. Hirschman.

Patriotic Carnival Starts.
Camp No. 5, of the Patriotic Order of Americans, will hold a patriotic carnival all this week, starting tonight on the circus grounds, Fifteenth and H streets northwest. The Zeidman and Polite Greater Shows have been engaged to furnish all attractions, and the affair will be managed by E. Lawrence Phillips, the popular amusement promoter.
