Fifty-five years after he pushed the button that sent the shells into the cruiser Reina Mercedes and saved United States vessels from a channel block, Capt. Althouse gave the ship a once over. At that time he recalled how

he was an ensign watch officer on the battleship Massachusetts in Santiago harbor, Cuba, July 4, 1898, when he sighted the Reina through a telescope sight in a turrent of 8-inch guns. "I pushed the button and

'bang' went the shells at her. I made a direct hit. I know because they came down and asked me how I fired. Then the batteries took her up, Ever since I've claimed I sunk her."






