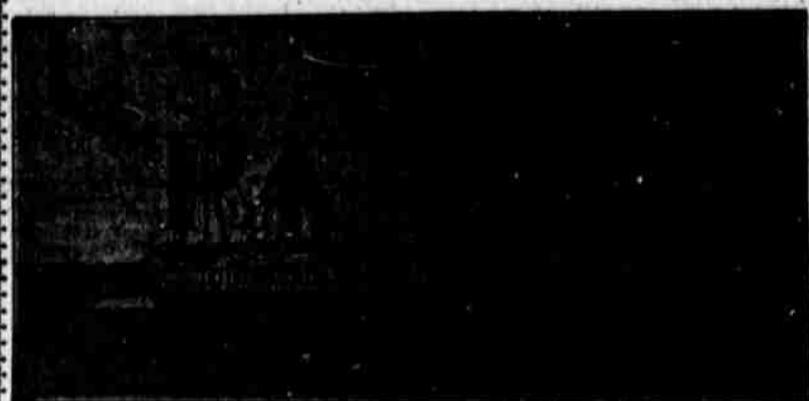

"A House Is Known By the Goods It Keeps"

Busy Brushes and Brooms Of Clean-Up Week Begin To Show Telling Effects

With numerous agencies and hundreds of individuals co-operating, Washington's 1916 "campaign for cleanliness" has entered upon its second week. The results of the first week are everywhere apparent. Tons of refuse have been removed to the city's dumps. Houses are receiving fresh coats of paint. Fences are appearing in refreshing applications of whitewash. The painters are busy and collectors of refuse are working overtime. On every side are evidences of the interest in the movement to make Washington a cleaner, more beautiful, and more sanitary city.

Officials of the Master House Painters and Decorators' Association, under whose auspices the campaign is being conducted, are more than pleased with the results thus far achieved. W. F. Andrews, president of the association, and A. M. McElhan, chairman of the campaign committee, have had a busy week, but say they feel well paid for their efforts.

Why They Take Interest.

"The members of the Master House Painters and Decorators' Association have been asked at times why they should take so much interest in the clean-up, paint-up campaign," said Mr. Andrews.

"This is quite apparent. The master painters, like all other good citizens, have civic pride enough to see what is good for the community and its needs, and to offer such suggestions and remedies as will place it in a good, sound, healthy condition.

"Certainly, the master painter is in a better position, from the very nature of his business, to get a line on the sanitary conditions of the house, home and community generally, than any one engaged in any other craft.

"His business brings him in close touch with the home, the office, and the work shop; he will see what others will not have an opportunity to see, whether all is as sanitary as it should be; he will notice the accumulation of ashes, trash, etc., where they ought not to be; he will also find out often that the householder will want a new wall paper, regardless of the germs that are probably already there, and he knows this ought not to be permitted; in many states it is actually forbidden by law.

Dangers From Infection.

"He will often also see the sick room just vacated, possibly by one with even some slightly infectious disease, no special care taken to put it in a sanitary condition. The master painter knows that this is wrong, that the room should be cleaned, repapered, and repainted for the next occupant, that there may be no further spread of disease.

"In a hundred ways the master painter sees conditions no others see them.

"It is, therefore, quite evident why the master painter is particularly concerned in this city-wide movement.

"It is not only the commercial end which the master painter has in view, but as a good citizen, he sees the real value to the community and the city of so commendable an undertaking. After a little consideration, it will be seen that the master painter is the logical man to be the guiding spirit in this warfare for cleanliness and freshness, and it behooves all good citizens to help spread this propaganda of clean-up, paint-up for their own individual good and for the civic betterment."

Other Cities Active.

Other communities as well as Washington are conducting a "clean-up, paint-up" campaign. Following is a "spring decalogue" published by the Kansas State board of health, which Health Officer W. C. Woodward says applies equally as well to conditions in the District:

"1. Thou shouldst cease thy hibernation and come out in the open, for it is now spring.

"2. Thou shouldst remember the springtime is a good time to clear away the rubbish and waste that has accumulated during the winter.

"3. Thou shalt not permit any fly-breeding places on thy premises, for thy neighbors will not hold thee guiltless if they are annoyed by thy flies.

"4. Remember clean-up week and keep it wholly; six days shalt thou labor and clean up and paint up, that thy days may be long in the land by reason of preventing sickness and fires.

"5. Remember thy friends—the rake and the hoe—for though they produce weariness of the flesh, they also produce strength of arm and good red blood.

"6. Thou shalt dress thyself according to the weather and not according to the almanac.

"7. Thou shalt eat greens and drink an abundance of water to 'thin' thy blood, thereby saving thy money usually spent for 'blood purifiers,' so that thou canst put something in the collection basket for those who are starving in Europe.

"8. Fret not thyself because of the surdize your neighbor is making in burning his trash, for the result of his labors will purify the surroundings during the days that are to come.

"9. Thou shalt swat the fly, bat the rat, and rouse mt the mouse.

"10. As the people are, so shall the community be. Keep clean."

Householders who may have been prevented by other duties from enlisting in the campaign last week will be given another opportunity to aid. The work will be continued for three weeks, and probably longer.

NO COMEDY IN THIS CHARLIE CHAPLIN SUIT

Process Server Waits in Vain to Summon Movie Star in Counter Action.

NEW YORK, April 25.—A process server stationed himself at the door of Justice Delehanty's part of the supreme court when Charlie Chaplin's suit against the Essanay Film Manufacturing Company and allied photography interests came up on two motions.

He was waiting a chance to put the motion picture comedian on the receiving end of a lawsuit. But Chaplin did not appear, his brother Sydney and a squad of lawyers representing his interests.

Charlie Chaplin sued the Essanay interests to restrain them from distributing and exhibiting a four-reel film called "Charlie Chaplin's Burlesque on Carmen." The star, who has since changed jobs, alleged that the "Carmen burlesque was padded out from a two-reel film, and that his reputation would be injured if it were shown.

Arguments were heard on the motion for an injunction, and on a motion of the defense for a transfer to the federal court, on the ground that Chaplin is a British subject. Decision was reserved.

The suit which threatens Chaplin is in the interest of the Essanay Company. This concern charges the star failed to appear in four comedies in the last half of 1915. It is alleged he contracted to act in ten and only acted in six.

An interesting commentary on present day values in the motion picture field lies in the fact that the Essanay Company will maintain it was damaged to the extent of \$1,000,000 through losing the four photoplays.

Keep Your Winter Clothing Safe From Moths



With Manahan Tarine Bags

The garments are put into the bags and are sealed—moths won't touch them—dust cannot get in. Sizes for all garments.

Caution—Be sure to wrap all light-colored, delicate furs, such as Ermine, also light, delicate-colored garments, in stout paper before putting in the bag.

Directions—Beat and brush out and off all moths and moth-eggs from the garments before packing away. Then hang them on the hooks inside, or otherwise pack them within. Next turn down the flap at the top and slide on the tube bag closer. Last, hang or lay the bag away.
