A REVIEW OF THE POLITICAL FIELD—NEW YORK CITY POLITICS. Special Dispatch to The Chicago Tribune. NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Though insisting that Grant is already next President, the Administration here are secretly troubled over the issue of Indiana.

THE CAMPAIGN IN CENTRAL ILLINOIS. SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Oct. 11.—To-morrow a Liberal meeting is to be held at Williamsville, in this county. Governor Palmer and Hon. J. C. Robinson will deliver the addresses.

TENNESSEE POLITICS. NASHVILLE, Tenn., Oct. 11.—The Democratic Convention met at Gallatin, yesterday, to nominate candidates for Congress for the Nashville district. The meeting was held in the evening.

A LIBERAL PROCESSION ATTACKED IN BALTIMORE. BALTIMORE, Oct. 11.—While the torchlight procession was passing the Republican headquarters on the corner of Baltimore and Franklin-sts., a riot broke out.

ATTEMPT TO BLOW UP A NEWSPAPER OFFICE. RALEIGH, N. C., Oct. 11.—The building in which the Daily Sentinel is printed was nearly destroyed by an explosion of powder, which some party unknown had placed under the press-room.

TUESDAY'S ELECTIONS. INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 11.—The additional official returns received to-day do not materially change the result given in last night's despatches.

INDIANAPOLIS, Oct. 11.—The official returns are not yet received by the city clerk, but from the first reports, Hendricks will have between 500 and 700 majority.

INDIANA, especially in Pennsylvania and Indiana. Pennsylvania has been carried by 30,000, and will give over 50,000 for Grant. Ohio has been carried by over 15,000, and will give more than twice that many for Hendricks.

NEW YORK. NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—The situation on the Stock Exchange today is not very bright.

THE MONEY MARKET. NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—The money market was at 5 to 7 per cent in the morning, but broke down in the afternoon, and for a time all loans were offered at 1 per cent.

FOREIGN EXCHANGE. LONDON, Oct. 11.—The money market is strong and higher. The prime bankers advanced their rates to 10 1/2% for sixty days, and 11 1/2% for ninety days.

GOVERNMENT BONDS. NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—The market for government bonds is quiet and closed firm. Central Pacific bonds closed at 107 1/2%.

REMARKS. FLOUR, choice family in fair demand, and at the close the market was more active for low grades, with rather better prices for good lots.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—Six burglars were foiled in an attempt to rob the Merchants' Bank at Manhattan, N. Y., on Monday night.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—The morning papers are full of reports of a robbery in the city.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 11.—General Francis A. Warner, Commissioner of Indian Affairs, has accepted the Professorship of History and Physical Geography in the scientific school of Yale College, and it is expected that he will at once retire from his present office.

THE FOOT AND THE SETTLE. The Administration here are constantly warring on one another. For instance, the evening organ, charged on Senator Harlan, conductor of the morning organ, that he has absorbed \$50,000 of the funds of the Republican Campaign Committee.

SENATOR SUMNER'S ILLNESS. A personal friend of Senator Sumner, who has just arrived from Europe, reports the health of the former to be in a critical condition.

SEPTENNIAL REGULATIONS. The Secretary of the Treasury has decided that the Inspectors cannot legally require steam vessels, and other public property, to be inspected by him.

COGNITIVE EXAMINATIONS. WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—The first of a series of five competitive examinations under the Civil Service rules, for the purpose of filling first-class vacancies now existing in the Treasury Department, took place to-day.

DEATH OF SENATOR SUMNER. The funeral of the late Captain Davenport, United States Navy, took place to-day at the Metropolitan Methodist Church.
