ADDRESS OF THE EXECUTIVE STATE COMMITTEE OF THE DEMOCRACY OF OHIO.

COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 13.—The Democratic Executive Committee will to-morrow morning address the following address:

To the Democracy of Ohio: The result of last Tuesday's election shows that Ohio was lost by a failure to poll the usual Democratic vote. Motivating us is the fact, justice to the Liberal Republicans and an earnest desire to retrieve the mistake, require us to declare that in our chief towns the Liberal strength exceeded our most sanguine estimate. In the country it fell short, but the aggregate of Liberals in cities and towns, added to the vote of the ticket, would have overcome the Republican majority at that election and the negro vote combined, and given to us a glorious victory.

Fellow-Democrats, work till November heartily and hopefully. The Liberals will take care of themselves. Let every Democratic County Committee show its devotion to the Democracy in each township who failed to vote last Tuesday, and direct its efforts to the bringing about of this sacred vote, and the fight is won in Ohio and the Republic.

SPEECH OF MR. GREELEY AT PLEASANTVILLE, N. Y. Special Despatch to the Chicago Tribune.

NEW YORK, Oct. 13.—Mr. Greeley made the following speech yesterday at a mass meeting of Liberals and Democrats at Pleasantville, near Chappaqua.

MR. CHAIRMAN, FELLOW CITIZENS AND NEIGHBORS: You are aware, doubtless, that I have shunned or seemed to shun any meeting since the late election. I have seen you in discussion during the present year, and yet when I heard that this meeting was to be held in our immediate neighborhood, and addressed by the Republican candidate for Lieutenant Governor, it seemed to me that I should show an undue reticence or shrinking if I hesitated about the ill to appear before you here.

It may now be positively stated that Secretary Boutwell has consented to be a candidate for Congress from the district which includes this county, in case the latter is elected Vice President.

the right of suffrage, and then you will have to educate them so that they can exercise it intelligently. Well, we fought that out, and to-day it is just as firmly established as the over-riding principle of the Constitution. It was the same as the white, and if all the people of all the States tried to change it they could not change it. It is in the Constitution, and so we must not let it be changed.

There are 20,000 people in the State of Ohio who are disfranchised. They are the colored people, and every race is exactly equal, and that cannot be changed. Now, then, these questions being dead, closed as utterly out of place as the question of whether this country shall be dependent on Great Britain or independent—for that was once a living issue—these questions being dead, I say that we shall no more undo what we have done, but shall go forward to living questions, and the first is that all the white people of this country shall be enfranchised just as all the black people are. (Applaud.)

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13.—The Weather Bureau has just had another decided success in its new role of adapting its probabilities to the wants of agriculture. The late frost in this vicinity was anticipated forty-eight hours in advance, and properly foretold by the Weather Bureau among the probabilities. It is believed that this new feature of the weather office is being taken, and the Board of Health is about to require a general vaccination of the population.
