SPEECH OF SENATOR SCHURZ AT ST. CHARLES, MO.

St. Louis, Oct. 14.—Carl Schurz made a speech at St. Charles last night, in which he said the Lib-eralists intended to fight vigorously to the end of the campaign; that there was nothing in events which had just taken place, and in the circumstances surrounding them, which would in any way dampen the spirit of men engaged in the liberal cause.

THE POLITICAL PROSPECTS IN MISSOURI.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 15.—Among the President's prominent visitors to-day was Governor Flech-er, of Missouri, who arrived in this city yester-day. In conversation with several prominent Administration men outside the portals of the White House, he confidently gave the electoral vote of Missouri to Grant by 20,000. He does not think that the German vote will be large enough to make any decided impression on the canvass, while he claims 75 per cent of the large emigration to Missouri since the last Presidential election, to the Republicans.
