Letter from Hon. Daniel W. Voorhees.

LETTER FROM HON. D. W. VOORHEES. Special Dispatch to the Chicago Tribune.

Washington, Oct. 16.—The news received in this city to-day from Mr. Voorhees, dated at Torre Haute, Oct. 15, says that he does not regret his defeat for Congress, but is glad to be permitted to practice his profession, which is more congenial and lucrative. As to the cause of his defeat, Mr. Voorhees says he foresees it when he said that the Democrats could not organize in the short time given them before the election, and that it was simply a stay-at-home vote in his party that beat him, and that the cause everywhere. Nobody thought there was a possibility of his defeat, and over-confidence led hundreds to stay away from the polls.

He writes, as follows, in regard to the Liberal movement: "I would not now attempt to bring about general amnesty, peace, and reconciliation between the sections, to purify the departments of the Government, now infested by a plundering ring engaged in the civil service of the country. The movement, I say, contemplating such results as these, cannot fail to elicit my zealous and unflinching support. The only mistake our friends made was in supposing that the progress of the masses of the Democratic party, of thirty-five years standing, against Mr. Greeley, could be entirely overcome in a brief canvass of sixty days. It takes more time than this to work such changes in the minds of honest, slow-thinking people. I thought so when I tried to prevent the nomination of Mr. Greeley, and now I know it was right. I have entire respect for this element in our party, and in time it will harmonize with the cause in which we are engaged. It takes more time than was given this movement."

Allow me to say a word on another point. Mr. Greeley has personally raised himself a thousand dollars in his estimation. His course has been all that could be desired, and I believe he would, if elected, be perfectly true to the principles he has so grandly proclaimed in his unvarnished addresses to the public. I shall not, therefore, be not only unhesitatingly but with pleasure, as a man who has established his claims to my admiration, notwithstanding my previous prejudice."

DEVELOPMENTS CONCERNING ELECTION FRAUDS IN PHILADELPHIA. Special Dispatch to the Chicago Tribune.

New York, Oct. 16.—The great frauds in Philadelphia are daily coming to light in the form of affidavits and testimony. The following document has appeared in print:

To the Reform Association of Philadelphia: GENTS: In the official count of votes for Governor, in the Fifteenth Ward, it is represented that the vote for Governor was 1,597, as follows: For Hartman, 4,490; for Buckalew, 1,307; for the Regular Republican ticket, 1,307; for the above fraud, you will oblige friends of Reform, Fifteenth Ward, and show how our return Election Judges alter the returns to suit their own ends, by fixing up the following figures: Respectfully yours, JOHN PUTNER, Judge of First Division.

JAMES NASH, Judge of Second Division. W. J. MURRAY, Judge of Seventh Division. ARNOLD MURPHY, Judge of Twenty-second Division.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 16.—Two hundred votes were counted more than were polled in each ward. In twenty-nine wards we have 5,500 fraudulent votes, but the Nineteenth Ward polled 1,500 fraudulent votes; Twentieth, 500; Tenth, 500; Fifth, 500; Fourth, 500; and Hartman; Sixteenth, 500; Seventh, the same. The fraudulent votes and false counts in Philadelphia amounted to 15,000.

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
