Alien Exclusion Act Urged by Rep. Free
"The United States and Japan will never go to war," declared Repre-

sentative Arthur M. Free, of California, before the Men's Club of the Church of the Good Shepherd, Sixth and I streets northeast. "However, if the immigration problem is to be completely settled, it must be by the passage of an alien exclusion act by the United States," he added.

"We have nothing against the people of Japan, but we must protect ourselves, as she has done, from excessive foreign competition and from the problems of cheap labor."

Vivisection Denounced As Cruel and Useless
"Vivisection of animals is unjustifiable and cruel," declared Charles Edward Russell addressing the Humane Educational Society at the Public Library last night. Mr. Russell declared that experiments on living animals had failed to aid medicine.

Comdr. J. Breck, U. S. N., condemned the torture that he said the fur hunter inflicts on his game. "Many of the wild animals who are caught in traps are allowed to drag

ALEXANDRIA TRADE EXHIBIT WILL OPEN ON NEXT TUESDAY

Music, Dancing, Speaking Will Be Nightly Features.

"Y" FUND IS \$30,530

Donations Rolling in Before Formal Launching of Campaign.

The Greater Alexandria Trade Exhibit, to be held at the armory May 2, 3 and 4, will be formally opened next Tuesday night promptly at 7:30 o'clock, when the electric lights will be flashed on by Mayor J. M. Duncan.

The last day of the exhibit will be "Suburban Day" and from 2 to 5 o'clock the armory will be open for the accommodation of people living in adjacent counties. Each evening from 7:30 to 11 o'clock there will be music and dancing and speaking, and in addition many prizes will be given away. Admission will be free.

Although the drive to raise \$75,000 to erect a Young Men's Christian Association building in this city will not be launched until next Tuesday, Capt. C. Keith Carlin, commander-in-chief of the drive, announced today that \$30,530 already has been raised from forty-two contributors. He stated that at least one-half of the fund is expected before the drive is formally launched. There are two donations of \$5,000 each, four for \$1,500 each, three for \$1,000 each, seventeen for \$500 each, and the remainder is made up of gifts of \$300 and less.
