WE HAVE ALREADY spoken of the fish exhibit at the Cincinnati Exposition as forming one of its most instructive and edifying features. No less so is the display of birds from the National Museum, comprising a collection of about five hundred species, prepared under the personal supervision of Mr. Robert Ridgway, the curator of the ornithological department of the Museum, and arranged in such a manner as to convey at a glance an intelligible idea of their nature, classification and local habitation.

It has in its present resources the nucleus of a magnificent collection, to which additions are constantly being made, and which, with comparatively small expenditure, may be made to excel any of the similar collections of the Old World. We see abundant evidences of it at the Cincinnati Centennial, where none of the exhibits excite more general interest than those which have been wisely furnished by the Government.
